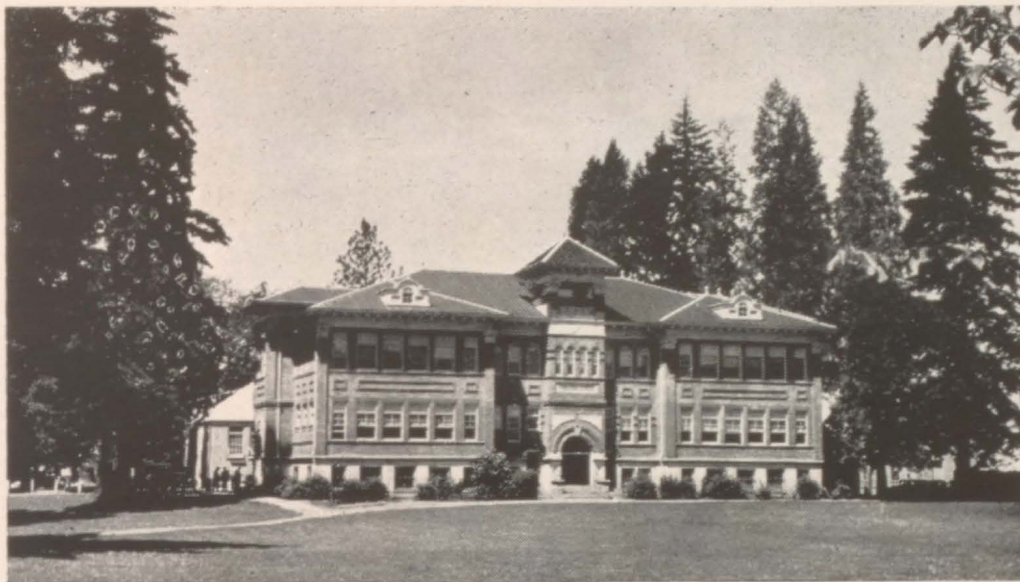




Foreword

In the following pages of this book we hope to bring to you a bird's-eye view of the accomplishments and activities of the year in Lebanon High School. We endeavor to record in this book memories that are dear to the hearts of our readers—that it may be a lasting memento of the school year 1938-1939.





As the eighty-one graduating seniors forever leave behind them the walls of Lebanon High, they depart with a knowledge that their school is more than an average building. Its romantic traditions and legends lend charm and beauty to the setting.

Spoken of as, "the most beautiful high school campus to be found anywhere in Oregon," the rolling ground covers 10 acres of shady lawn. Scores of firs, hemlocks, maples, and oaks spread their sheltering limbs over the campus, protecting it from the fury of the elements. There is found on the campus several spots of sentimental value to the past generations. In the remote northwest corner of the plot once stood the famous Santiam Academy, the first college of its type to be erected in the Pacific northwest. A gray, weather beaten rock commemorating the ending of a westward migration ending at Lebanon in early days stands proudly near the front entrance. There is found an ageing cement bench, erected by the class of '16 around the oldest maple on the campus.

High above the front entrance to the main building rests a famous bell, cast by the Menelly Foundry at Troy, New York, in 1858 especially for the Santiam Academy. Thence moved to its present location upon the completion of the high school building in 1909. In the early days, transportation was solely by water, and the large bell was shipped by boat around the Cape Horn and thence up the coast to Portland, where oxen finished its journey to Lebanon. Many pioneers of the west can well remember when they were called to class by this bell.

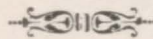

Student Council

Another successful year of student council work is nearly completed at Lebanon High School. This organization was constructed primarily to put part of the administrative powers in the hands of the students. This is known as student or self-government, and is used extensively throughout schools in Oregon.

The capable student body officers that were selected by the members of the senior high last year as follows: President, Truman Forbis; vice-president, Sheldon Burghardt; secretary, Sena Edwards, and treasurer, Gladys Brown. The remainder of the council consists of either the president from each active organization in the school, or a representative that is elected from that organization. Mr. Doughton, principal at Lebanon this year and advisor to the student council, has found it pleasing to work with the organization that we have here.

Regular council meetings were first held second period on every other Wednesday, but as the business increased, it was necessary to hold meetings once each week.

Lebanon has retained its membership in the Oregon Association of Student Officers and has appointed vice-president Sheldon Burghardt and Marjorie Parton as delegates to represent Lebanon at the convention that is held in Corvallis. The convention teaches students valuable points in self-government that would be helpful to any school council.

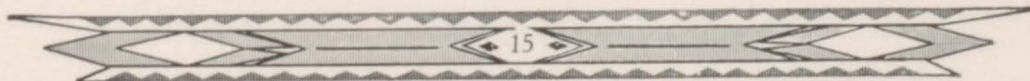

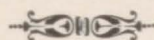

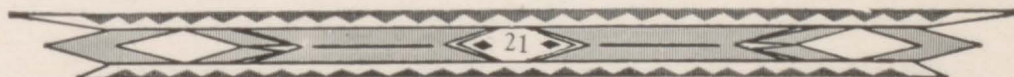

Senior Class History

Introduction—The class of '39's days are numbered and it will not be long until we leave the halls of Lebanon High forever. But the knowledge we have gained and the memories of our four years in school remain. Looking back over the past, we can sincerely say, "They have been worth while." Not only have they been worth while in their educational opportunities, but also in social activity experiences.

Freshmen year—On September 16, 1935 the class of '39 made its appearance at Lebanon High School. The 107 Freshmen were initiated into the Student Body at the freshmen reception held on October 11.

These shy, but enthusiastic rooks eagerly enrolled in their classes, and with zeal and zest, they entered into the activities of the school. Many of them, making use of their natural talents, joined the band and Glee Clubs.

The freshmen class chose the following for their officers: President, Truman Forbis; Vice President, Donald Chamberlin; Secretary, Jack Zimbrick; Treasurer, Bill Nash; Sergeant-at-arms, Bob Simpson, and student council representative, Doris Kirk. Mrs. Shanks was the class advisor.

Sophomore year—On September 14, 1936 another school year began, and 88 of the former freshmen returned to Lebanon High as sophomores. They were eager to make their second year even more successful than their first had been. Realizing that the leadership they had the year before was one factor in their successful career, the sophomores re-elected the president, Truman Forbis, and the secretary, Jack Zimbrick. The other officers were: Vice President, Bob Simpson; Treasurer, Don Chamberlin; Sergeant-at-arms, Elmer Smith. The class advisors were Miss Bennett and Mr. Wiscarson.

The sophomore class was well represented in the band and even better represented in the Glee club for one sophomore girl, Sena Edwards, was chosen to sing first alto in the Girl's quartet. Three sophomores, Don Chamberlin, Dick Backberg, and Ellamae Pitzing, had speaking parts in the operetta, "The Nightingale," presented by the Glee club.

In sports, the sophomores made a very good showing. Five of them received a letter in one or two of the three major sports: football, baseball and basketball and two won letters in each of them.

Junior History—On September 13, 1937 the sophomore class returned for their third year of high school, this time as juniors. Only 80 of the initial 107 that started in 1935 returned, but the remaining eighty had a very definite goal to reach before the end of their third high school year. The goal was being to make enough money to entertain the seniors in grand style at the junior-senior picnic and the grand Prom.





Knowing that this goal could not be reached without hard work, the junior class wisely chose the following officers: President, Barbara Horner; Vice President, Ted Pyle; Secretary, Kathryn Lovett, and Treasurer, Marjorie Parton. Miss Masterton was class advisor.

They started their campaign with the usual selling of candy, hot dogs, and souvenirs at the football games, and the sponsoring of school dances in the gym. The most successful dance was the Halloween dance held after the Lebanon-Albany football contest.

Instead of the usual junior Hi-Jinx, the class presented a play entitled, "The Antics of Andrew," on May 6. The cast included Truman Forbis, Jack Zimbrick, Jack Dillard, Marjorie Ashby, Ellamae Pitzing, Lois Bowman, Barbara Horner, Bob Forrey, Sheldon Burghardt, Kathryn Lovett, Wilber Lanning, and Arlo Lindsey. The play, a comedy, was a huge success.

The juniors entertained the seniors at the junior-senior Prom on May 27. The theme of the prom was "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs." The gym was converted into a mythical forest by the dozens of small trees around the edge and one large tree in the middle of the room. The branches of the center tree extended in every direction with long streamers of leaves hanging from them. Cunning cardboard dwarfs and the many small cardboard animals furnished atmosphere, and were the hit of the evening. The junior-senior picnic was held on May 18 in Benton-Lane Park.

Many juniors gained fame in music. Don Chamberlin became a valuable member of the Boys' quartet, and three junior girls held places in the Girls' quartet. These girls were Mary Fredericks, Sena Edwards, and Lois Bowman. The Girls' quartet won first division rating in both the state contest held at Forest Grove and district contest at Seattle. The Boys' quartet placed in second division. Three of the six soloists who sang at the state contest were juniors. They were Sena Edwards, Don Chamberlin, and Mary Fredericks. Mary tied for third place in Girls' high voice at the state contest and took second division rating at the district contest. In the operetta, "Iolanthe," three juniors had leading roles; they were Mary Fredericks as Phyllis, the Heroine; Lois Bowman as the Queen of the Fairies; and Don Chamberlin as the Earl of Mountorot. Thirteen other juniors were in the chorus on the stage.

The junior class had more lettermen than any other class in school. Thirteen received letters in one of the three major sports, and three of these, Truman Forbis, Bob Simpson and Arland Christ, received letters in each of the three major sports. Several other juniors won letters in track or boxing. The junior girls, not to be outdone by the boys, were the champions of the girls' class teams in volleyball and basketball.





Four members of the junior class, Truman Forbis, Marjorie Wilson, Alro Lindsey and Barbara Horner, were chosen for the Honor Society.

In boys' inter-mural basketball, the junior team took first place with nine wins against no defeats. Stan Lenox captained the squad.

Senior year—Seniors, with regret that it was their final year and with the determination to make this year their crowning triumph, enrolled for the last time at Lebanon High on September 12, 1938. The following officers were chosen: President, Bob Simpson; Vice President, Don Chamberlin; Secretary, Mildred Wendling; Treasurer, Jack Dillard; Sergeant-at-arms, Harvey Cutts, and Student Council Representative, Kathryn Lovett. Mr. Bennett was class advisor.

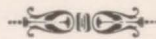

FIRST: We give and bequeath to our inferiors, the junior class, our beloved Mr. Bennett as faculty advisor for next year.

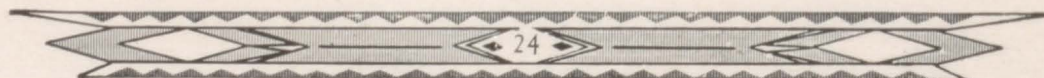
SECOND: In our future absence, we leave a small amount of needed extra hall space to the remainder of the student body to be used very carefully and quietly.

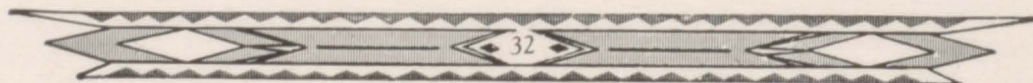
Junior Class Play

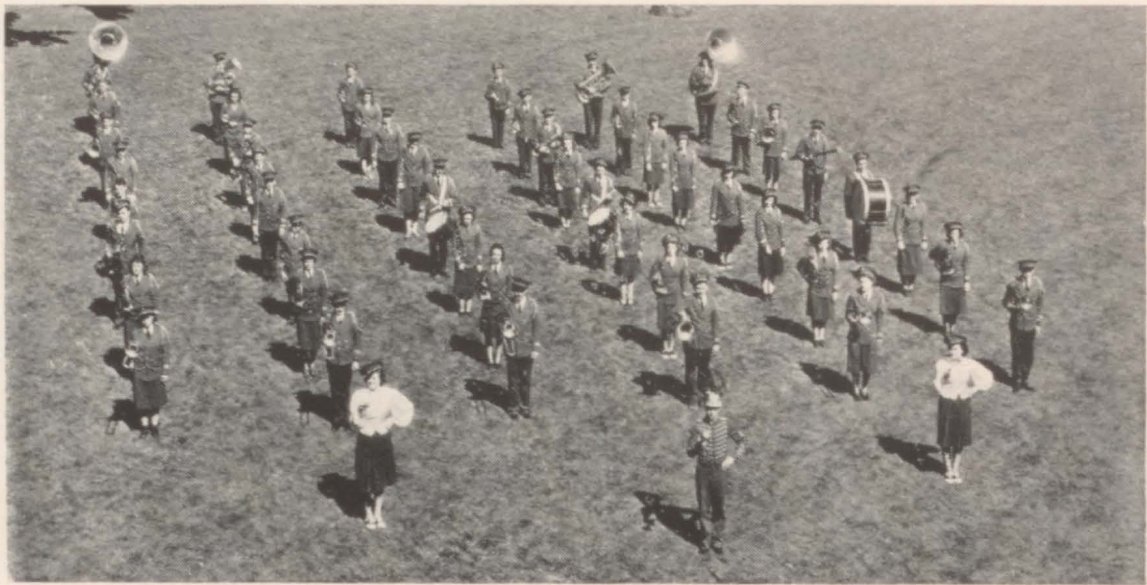
On January nineteenth the band gave the most ambitious concert given. This concert was also broadcast from KOAC.

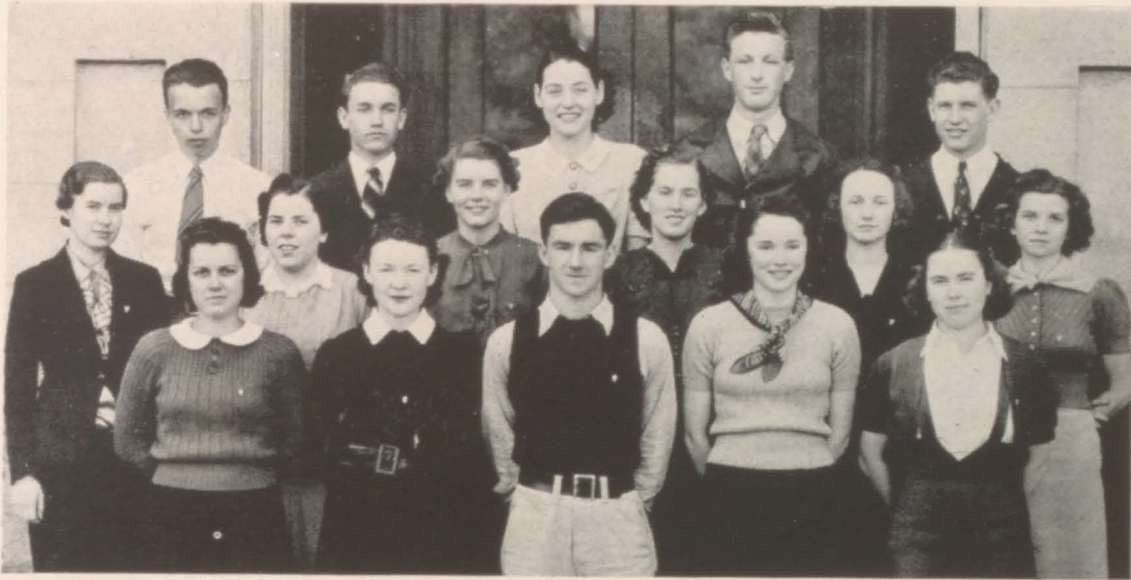

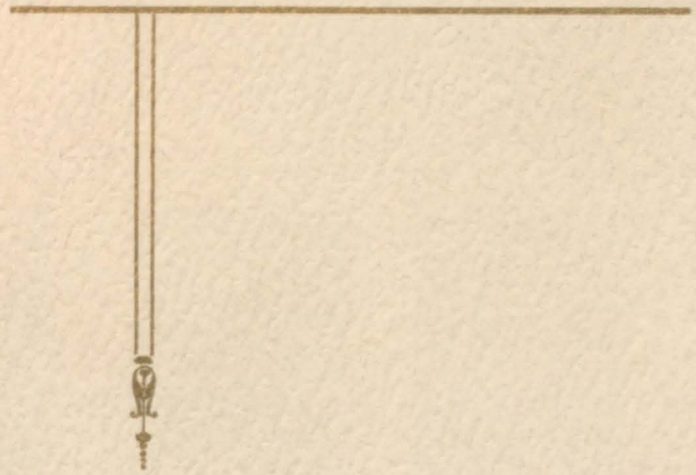
Fire Squad

Football

This was the first year that the Berrypickers had a home turf to play upon. Last year the Newport field was sown with a wieri grass that developed a good firm footing. All the home contests were night games under the newly installed arc lights.

Dick Miller was the bad member of the local club, often being ejected on fouls. However, when the going got rough, he could always be counted upon to come through with a grand style of ball.



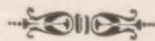


This was the second year under the coaching of Lebanon's new athletic director, Jack Woodard. Large crowds turned out for all home contests to completely fill the gymnasium nearly every game. Late spectators were often forced to use special chairs, the folding bleachers having been filled.

A new type of basketball war-fare was used this year. Instead of the usual slow and careful method that has been the general style here during the past, the Berrypickers played a fast breaking game that saw the men break down the court at top speed to set a play up and then take quick shots at the basket before the opposition could get set. In this way, the shorter squad of Lebanon courtmen could hold a taller aggregation in check. A zone defense that shifted quickly into a man to man defense or vice versa was used to a good advantage.

Every afternoon approximately twenty trackmen report out for drill under the coaching of Jack Woodard.

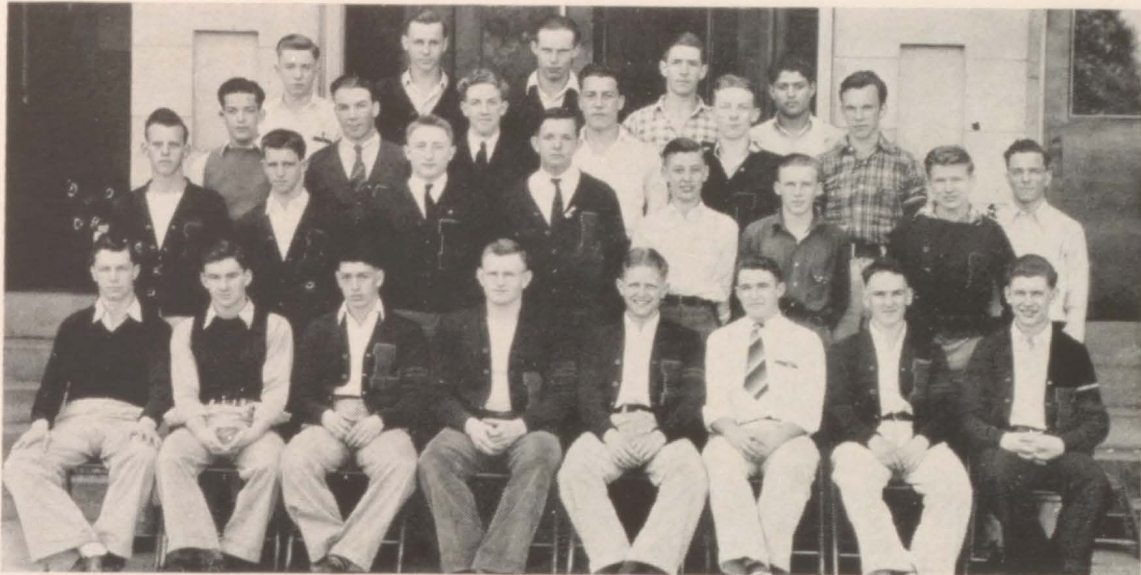
The hard dirt track is located on Newport field, being a scraped runway treated with chemicals to harden the surface and kill the turf growing in the oval.

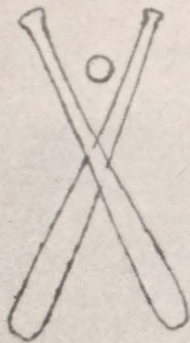

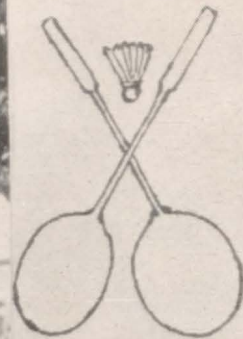

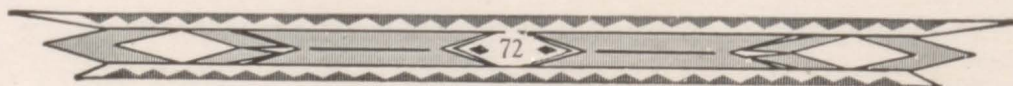
