





Foreword

In presenting this yearbook, it is the desire of the editors to record memories of the organizations and classes of Lebanon High in pictures and print that will be cherished by all students in later years.







Alma Mater

As the 1940 graduating seniors leave behind them the school and campus of Lebanon High, they leave with a remembrance of the many pleasant incidents in connection with the course of study and activities. They will also remember the beauty of the school building and campus and the romantic days spent there. They will always remember that the campus is one of the most beautiful ones to be found among high schools in the state of Oregon.

Besides these features, there are many historical facts connected with the school and site that will always remind the seniors of the institution from which they are departing. In the extreme northwest corner of the campus once stood the Santiam Academy, the first college of its kind to be erected on the Pacific coast. The southeast entrance is adorned by the oldest maple tree on the campus, around which is a cement bench, erected by the class of '16. Also at that corner of the campus is placed a weather beaten rock, upon which is a bronze plaque, designating that area as a portion of the old Oregon Trail.

At the tip top of the building still remains the old bell which formerly served the Santiam Academy and from there was moved to the high school in 1909.

As the largest graduating class in the history of Lebanon High School bids farewell to their alma mater, they will hold in mind a few facts and features of their school days inside those walls which will be cherished memories in later years.

Senior Class History

In 1936, 128 rather bewildered students entered dear old Lebanon High School destined to become one of the most celebrated classes in the school history.

Much of the greenness was removed at the annual Freshman reception held for the class by the upperclassmen.

But fate had not decided upon this being an average class, because it proved to be quite ambitious and active. Harold Howard was elected president; Harry Miller, vice president; Shirley Keebler, secretary, and Jack McDonald, treasurer.

In October an elaborate party and dance was given under the able supervision of the class adviser, Mrs. Shanks, in the newly constructed gymnasium.

In December Harold Howard moved to California and Glenn Kobow was elected to succeed him.

In the operetta, "The Nightingale," Dorothy Bohle, Harry Miller, and Bernice Strickler had speaking parts. The class was well represented in the chorus also.

This year saw the last of the Hi-Jinx in which the freshman skit was a great success.

Even though the social activities of the class were numerous, several of the members hung up scholastic records.

In the fall of the year of 1937, approximately one hundred and ten students continued on to the sophomore class. Our greenness was gone, and we were ready to start the new school year with a fierce determination to show the rest of the L. H. S. what we could do.

When the time came for the election of officers, the sophomroe class chose Glenn Kobow as president, Wes Gillenwater as vice-president, Helen Michelson as secretary, Bill Warden as treasurer, and Harry Miller as representative.

That year sophomores who majored in commerce were allowed to take typing and shorthand. Dorothy Bohle made the highest speed record of any of the first year typists, attaining a speed of seventy words a minute.

The sophomore class contained many musical members. Among them Edna Mae Myers, who sang first alto in the Girls' Quartet, and Dorothy Bohle, who accompanied the Glee Club in its work. There were six sophomores in the High School Band and many more in the Glee Club;





furthermore several members went to the Pacific Campus in order to participate in the Fifteenth Annual State Music Tournament.

The sophomore class was well represented on the honor roll, too, in spite of their many activities.

Miss Elizabeth Bennett was our advisor who gave us unlimited cooperation and help.

The 1940 graduating class entered its junior year in September, 1938, numbering 111 strong, the largest junior class in L. H. S. history.

The class started in fine style by electing these officers: Dorothy Bohle, president; Harry Miller, vice-president; Helen Michelson, secretary, and Betty McKinney, treasurer. The class of '40 built itself a splendid reputation in its junior year with the members participating in athletics, music, and other school activities.

The organization presented an unusually successful play called "Crashing Society." This was a comedy concerning the Dunnigans, a typical American family, who inherited a million dollars and decided to enter New York society. 

Band

For the fourth consecutive year, the Lebanon High School band captured a "superior" or 1 rating at the state high school band contest. This year the band played "Celebre Toreador" as a warm-up march, "Stradella" overture as a selective number, and the required "Niobe," a romantic legend, in the contest at Albany, April 13.

Not only the band, but soloists and ensembles as well carried off honors at the contest. The clarinet quartet rated second, the brass quartet first, Norman Leckband, cornet soloist, first, and Melvin Gilson, second in the oboe solo division.

The band director, Gordon Tripp, is just completing his first year at Lebanon.

This year in the contest, Lebanon was the only band in Class D, C, or B to win a first division rating. The two other Class B bands, Silverton and McMinnville, were both placed in Division III. Last year McMinnville was placed in the first division with Lebanon at the Salem State contest,





but were given a III, compared to Lebanon's I in the Nationals at Portland.






HAROLD MICHELS: A determined and fighting member of the squad who filled the fullback position. "Mike" was a valuable player on defense, breaking up many aerial attacks.
