Bend, winner of the district crown and represented in the state tournament, squeaked past Lebanon, 26-25. Actually the Warriors tied the powerful Lava Bears, but a successful conversion was nullified by an off-side penalty.

The Lebanon men upset their ace rival, Sweet Home, 19-13 in enemy territory. The Warriors crushed Monmouth $34-0$ while losing heart-breakers to Redmond, Cottage Grove, and Corvallis

In their last home game of the season, Lebanon lost a 19-13 decision to the Salem Vikings. After completing a pass to the Salem two-yard line in the fading seconds of the fourth quarter, the Warriors were unable to push over the winning touchdown.

This season a green Warrior squad with only three returning lettermen surprised football fans all over the valley by their vastly improved showing. The "green" Warriors piled up 139 points against 175 for their opponents- 139 points as compared to 19 points last year!

This year sees only seven graduating seniors out of a ball club of 30 . The seniors graduating this year are: Len LaFond, right half-back; Gordon Barnes, left half-back; Kirby Avrit, fullback; Burl Lott, left half-back; Keith Richard, center! Jim Saxton, left guard; Gerald Siewell, right guard.

With only three returning lettermen, Victor Dixon, Don Chamberlain, and Dale Hasenyageer, Coach Bud Page had to depend on less experienced players for much of this year's team. Paced by these three lettermen were Kenny Kirkelie, guard, Donnie Carrol, guard, Mervel Stone, guard, Malcolm McBride, forward, Richard Connet, forward, and Keith Richard, forward.

Monte Seigner turned in a commendable performance in the position of reserve center wheen Dick Cieslak moved away shortly after the season began. Other "B" squad players who showed themselves worthy of mention with the " $A$ " squad were Benny Monroe and Dick Christensen. Outstanding characteristics of the Warrior ball players were: the jumping of "Vic" Dixon, the speedy ball handling of "Merv" Stone, the hook shots of Dale Hasenyager, the beautiful two-hand jump shots of Captain Don Chamberlain, and "Mac" McBride's dead-eye for the basket. The only casualty of the season was Donnie Carrol's broken finger which didn't prevent him from participating in the closest of games.

The game ended in bedlam as the Lebanon Warriors almost narrowed the score to a victory for the East. However, the West maintained their lead to win this classical fracas. Lebanon did prove itself to be the outstanding team at the Jamboree by defeatina Albany 22-17, and tieing Corvallis 24-24.

The team made two trips to the coast; one ending in defeat, the other in victory. The first trip was to Coos Bay for a two-game weekend in which Marshfield proved itself worthy of being the champions of the state. They gave the Warriors the worst defeat of the season. In the next coast trip, the Warriors brought home better results, as they walked over Newport by a score of $52-42$ and scalped Toledo by 17 points.

The season held many thrillers; the most heart-breaking one being with Lebanon's old rival, Albany. The Warriors were leading throughout the game with Albany hot on their heels. With a few seconds left, it seemed like a certain victory for Lebanon. But this seeming victory was turned into unbelievable defeat when Neil Causbie sank a field goal for the Bulldogs iust before the whistle blew to give the final score a one point difference of 61-62 in favor of the opponents.

Tradition was upheld in the games with Salem. The Vikings captured the first win, but the Warrior came back in the second bout to score a $53-51$ victory.

Captain Don Chamberlain took high scoring honors for his team this year with a total of 290 points. Malcolm McBride followed him with 253 pints, and Dale Hasenyager basketed 227 points.
