# Registration

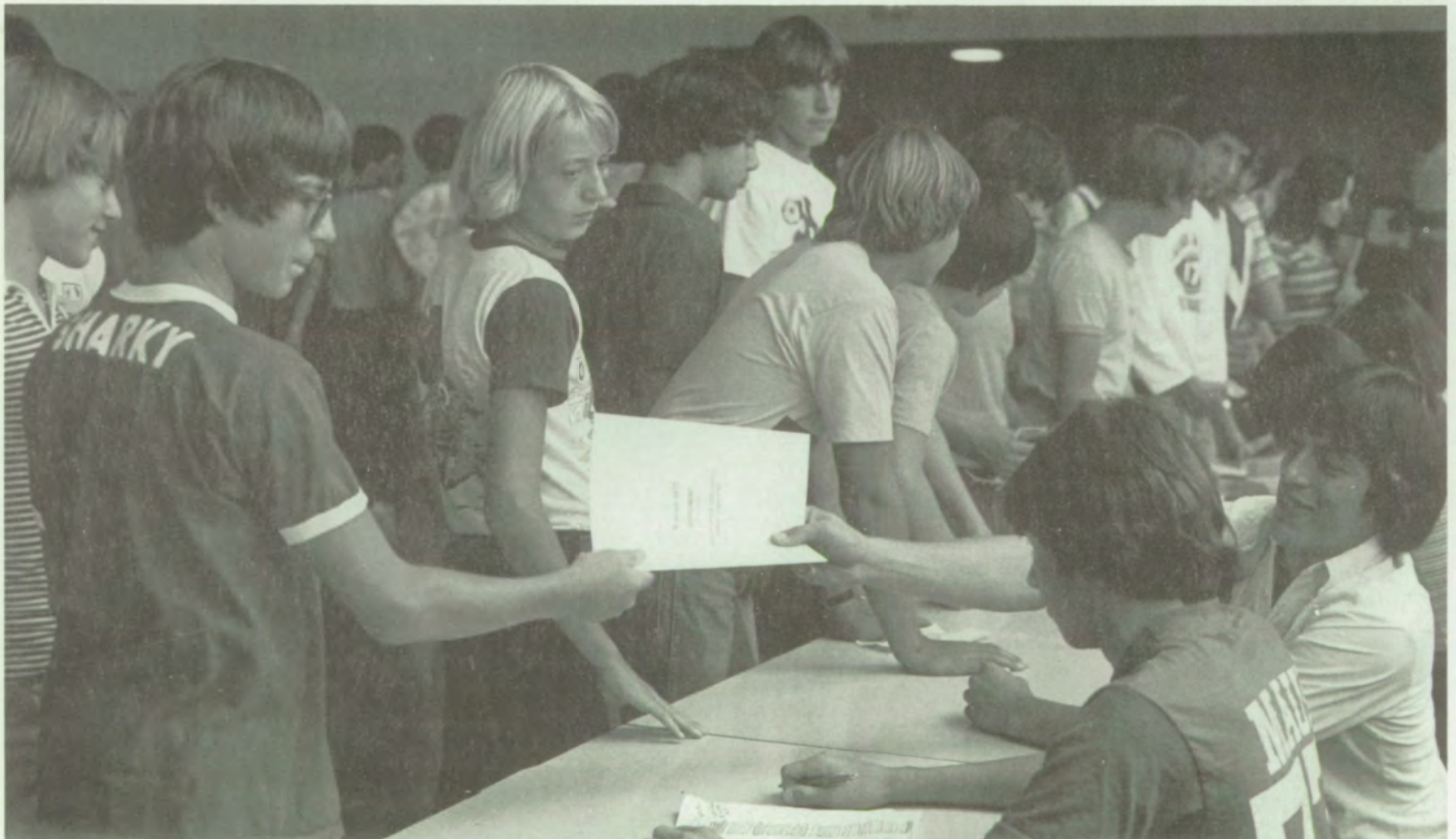

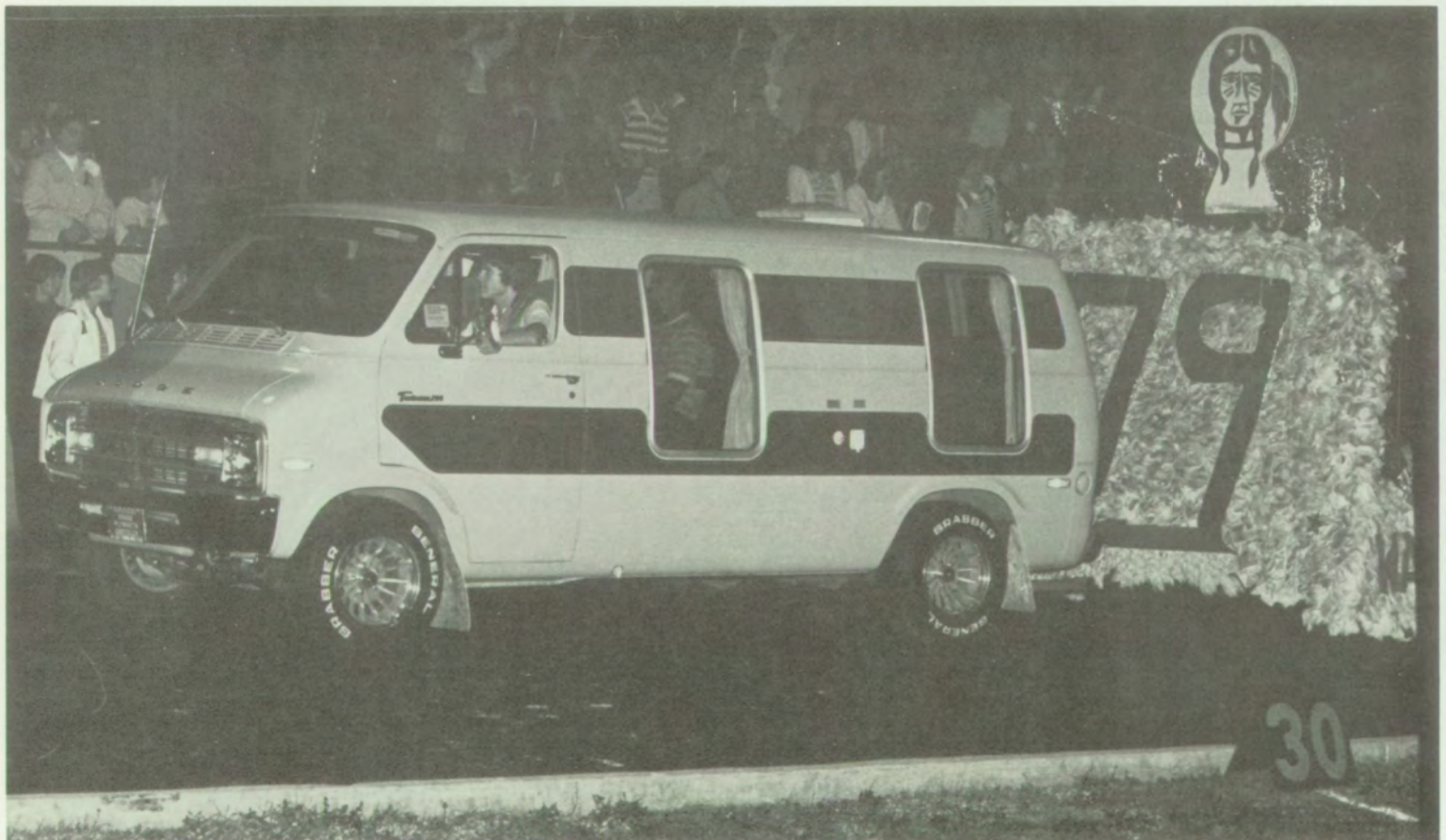

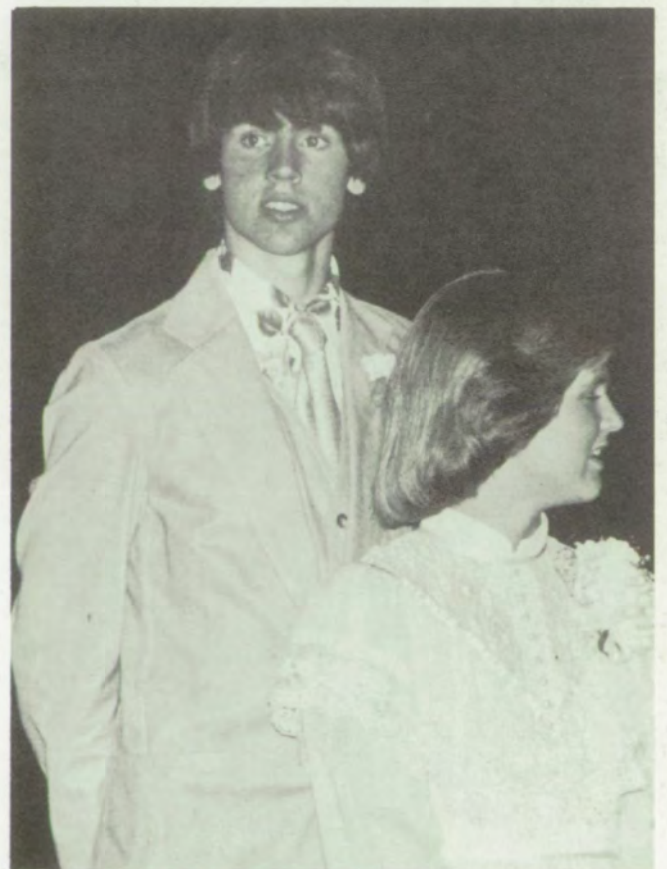

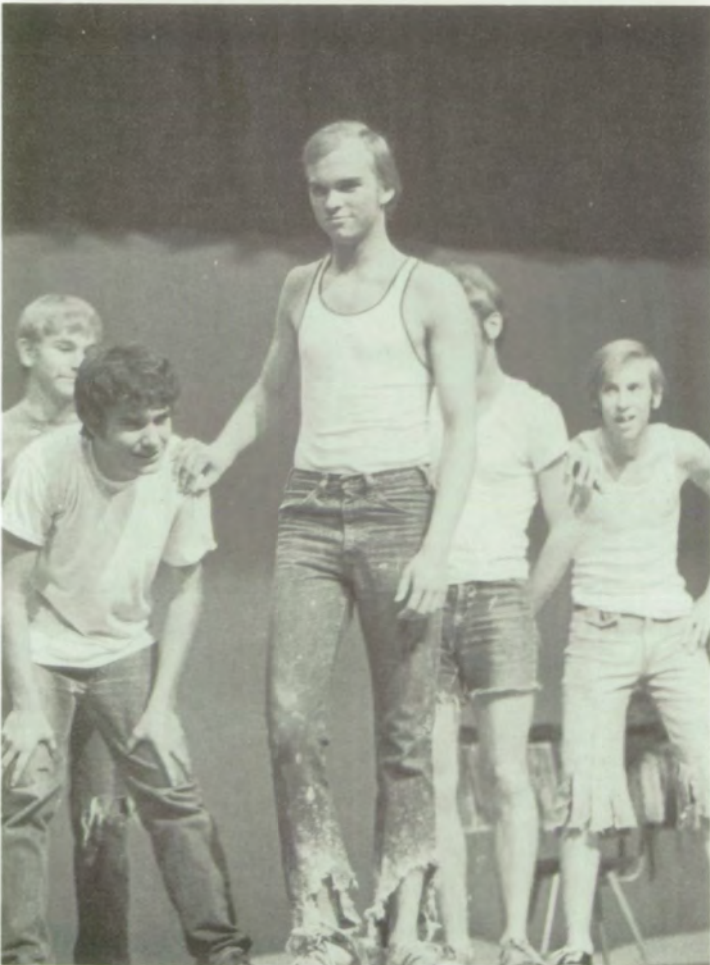

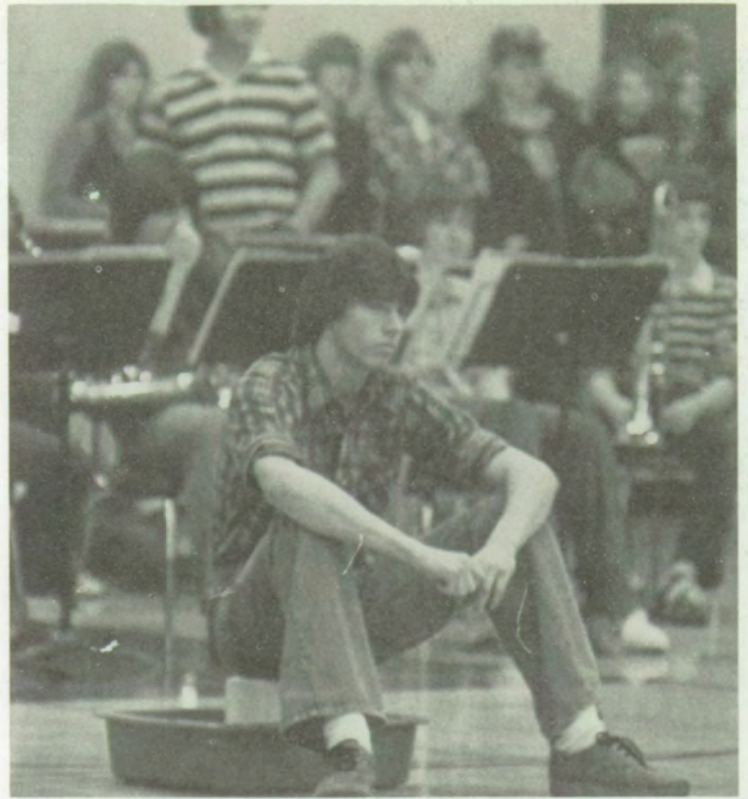

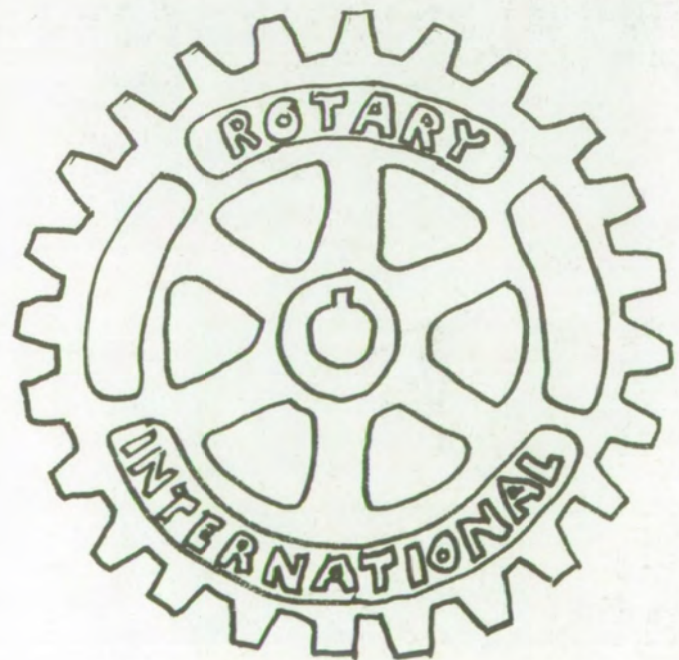

# Student Government

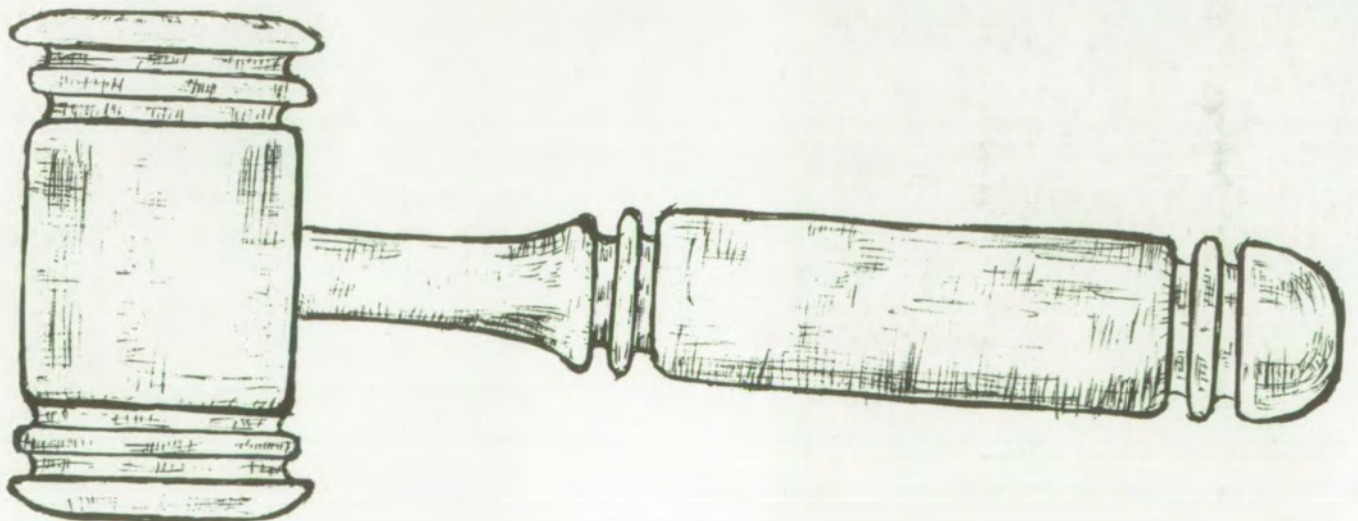

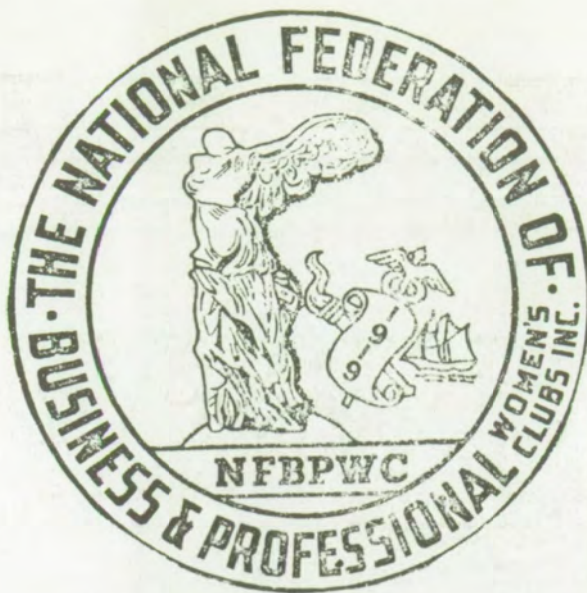

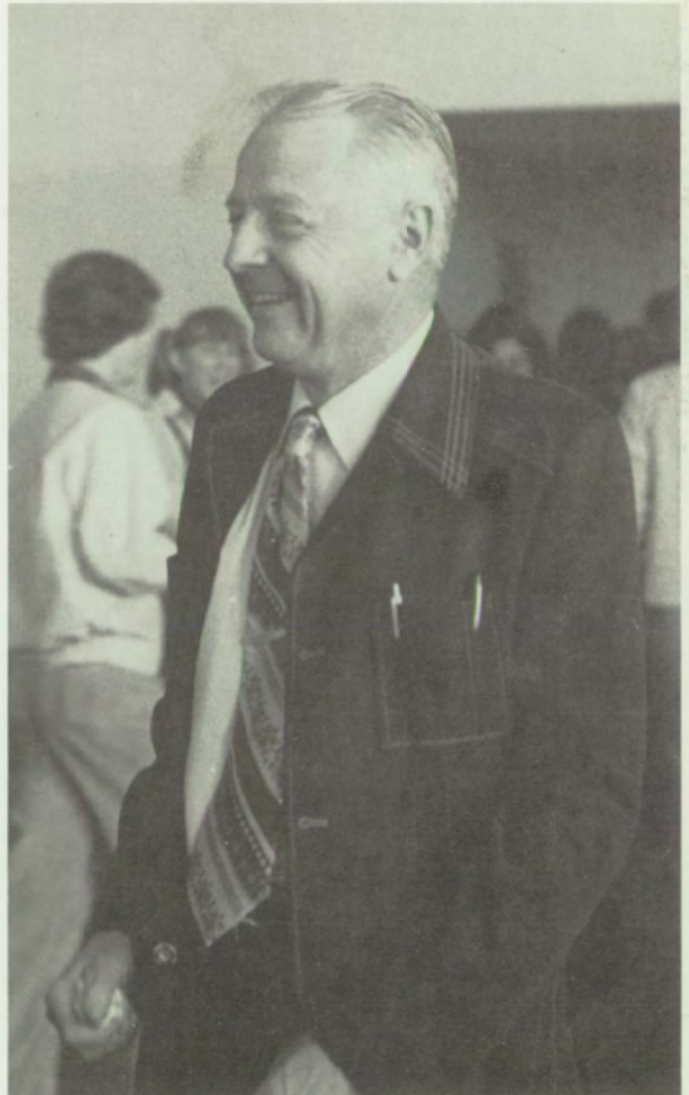
**TO MY FELLOW WARRIORS:**

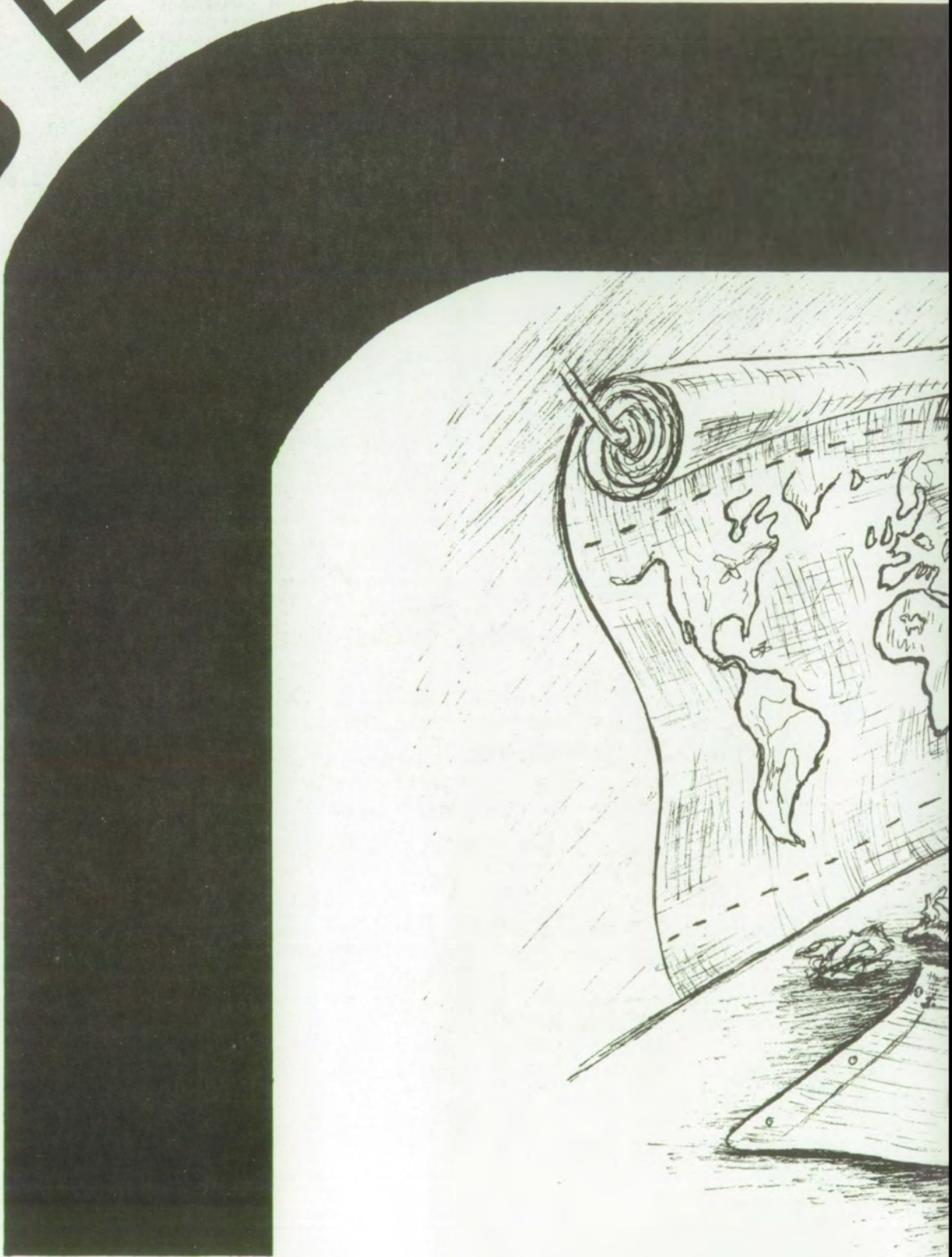


It all started in the depression years of the 1930's when Miss Quinn, my high school senior English teacher, called me aside and said -- "Somehow you must go to college - come to my early morning class to prep for college entrance exams." Here it was that insight was gained through cadet teaching that teaching for me was fun and a rewarding mutuality between my personality and the students and staff with whom I shared and worked. Besides handling these responsibilities, members of the administrative staff always found time to listen to and help individual students with their problems and concerns.



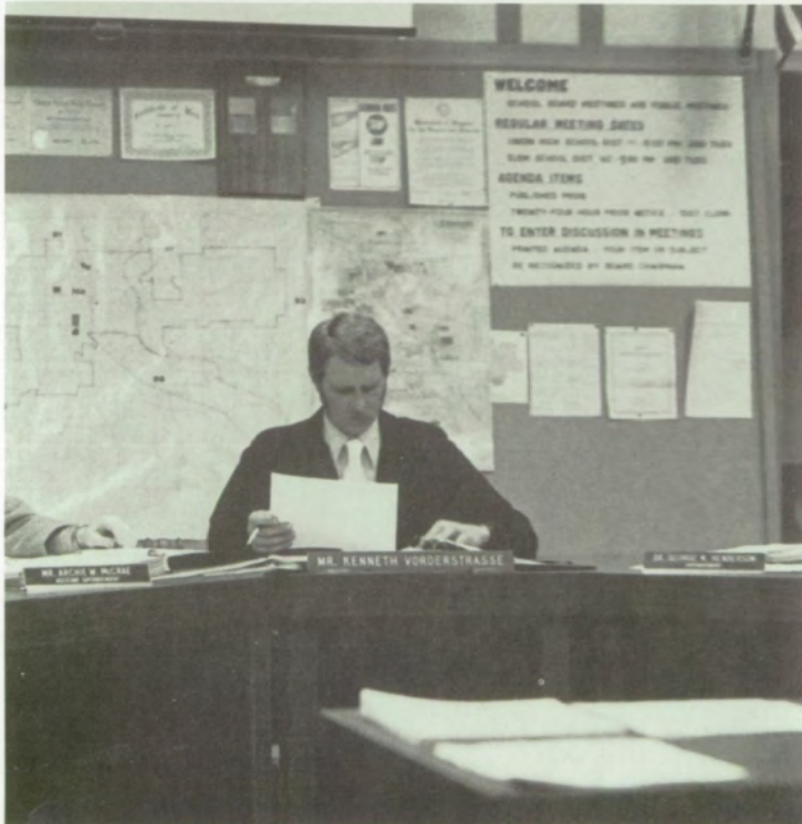

## Business

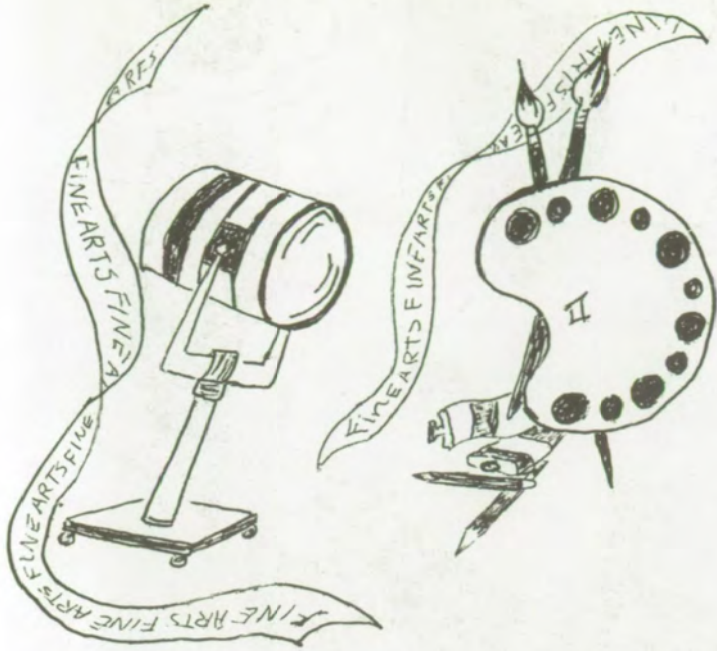

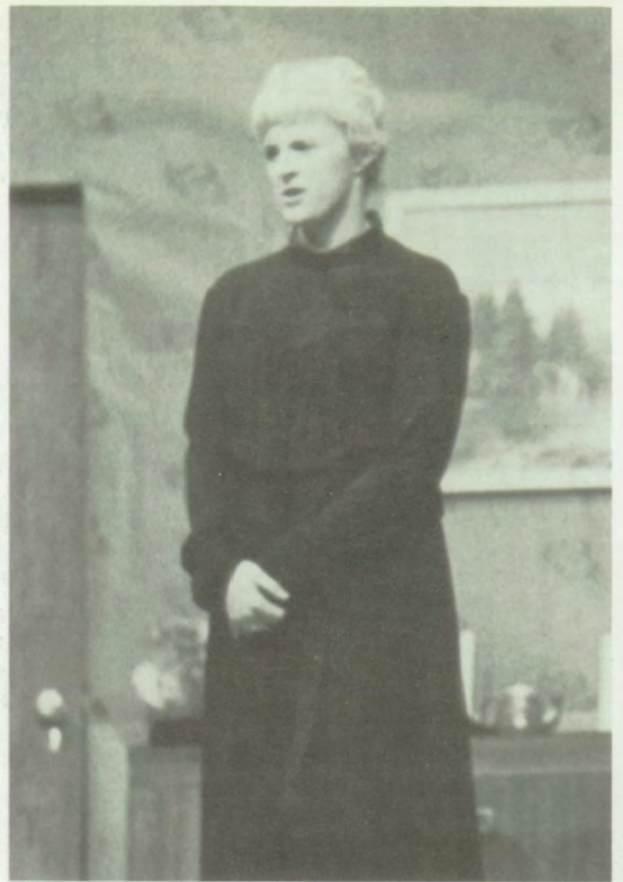

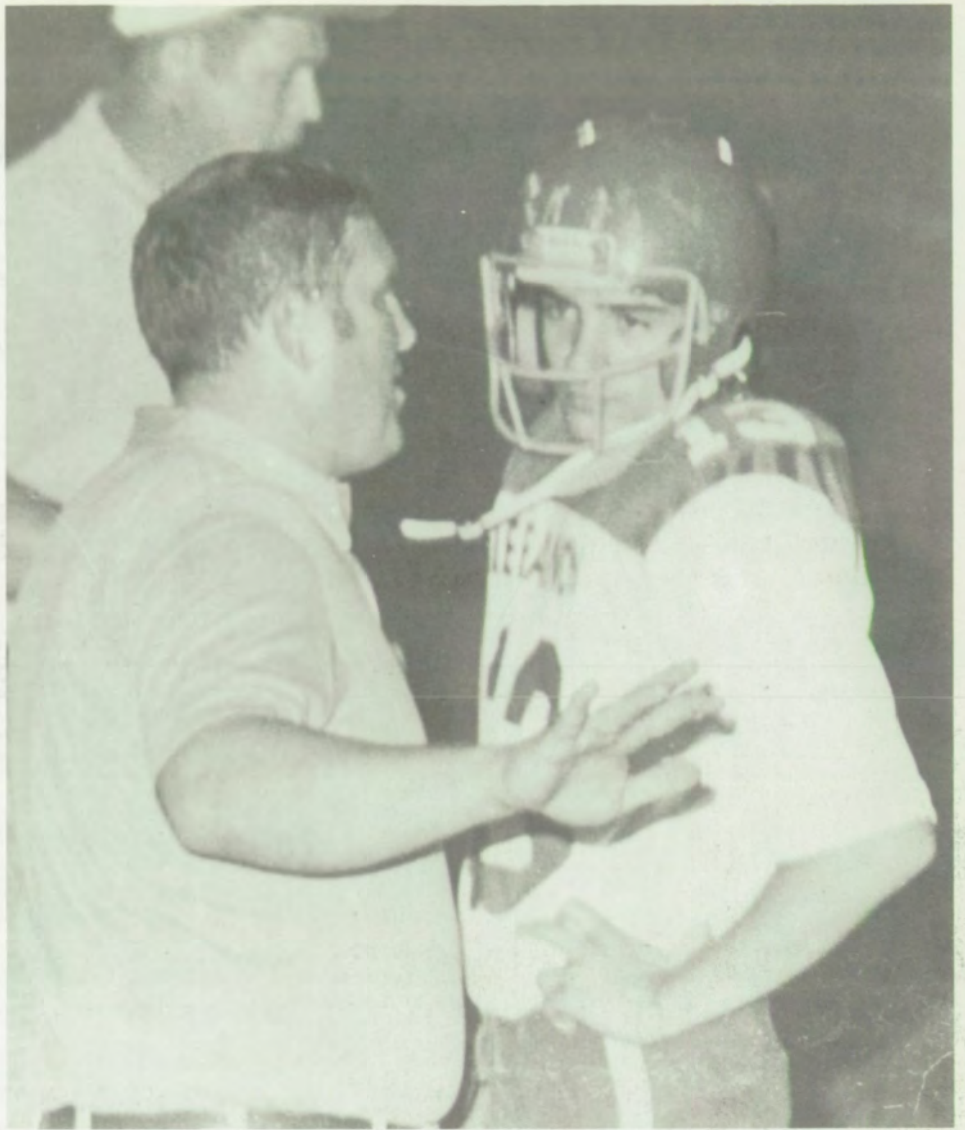

# Boys' Gymnastics

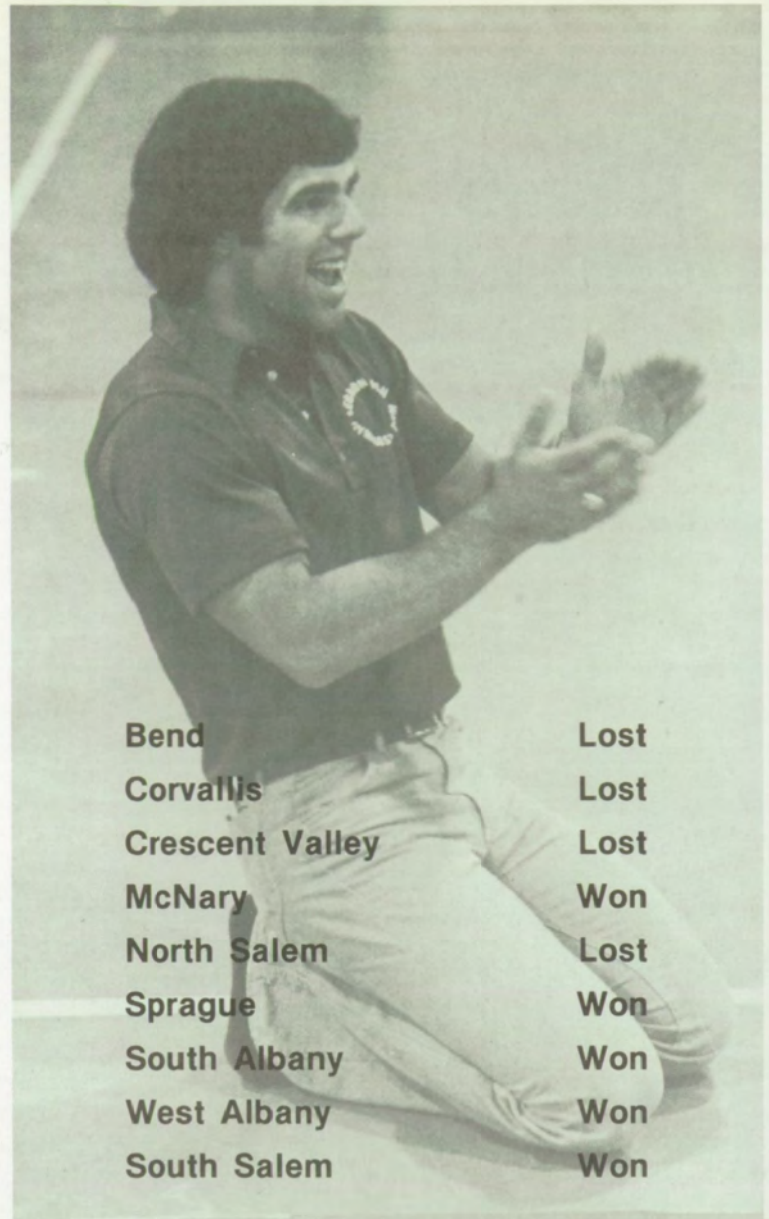

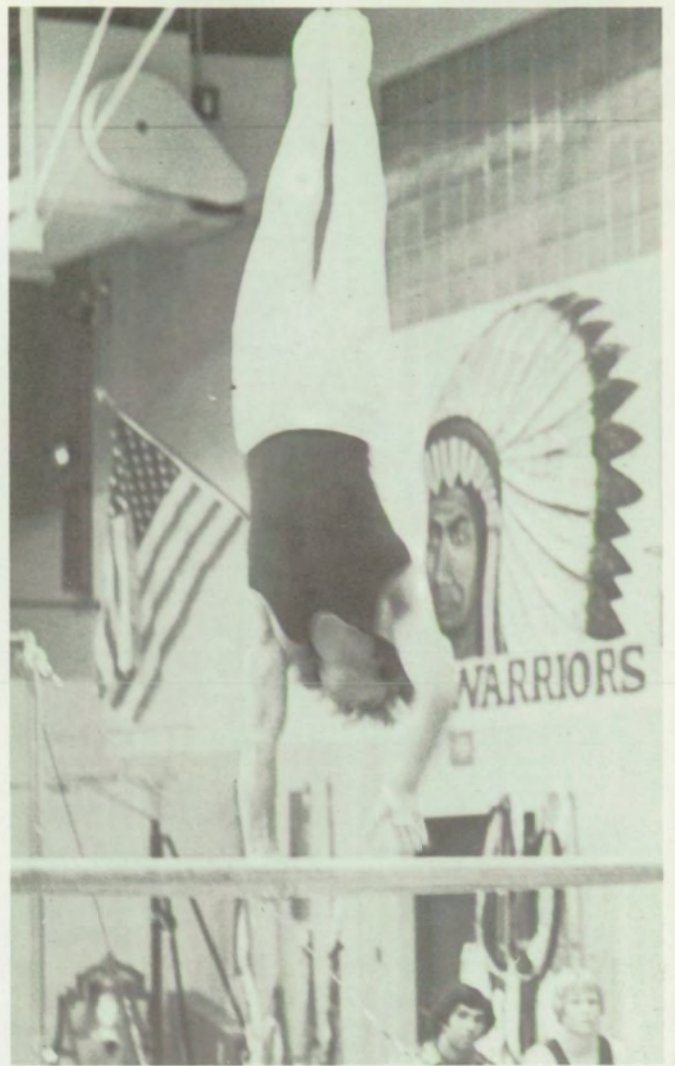

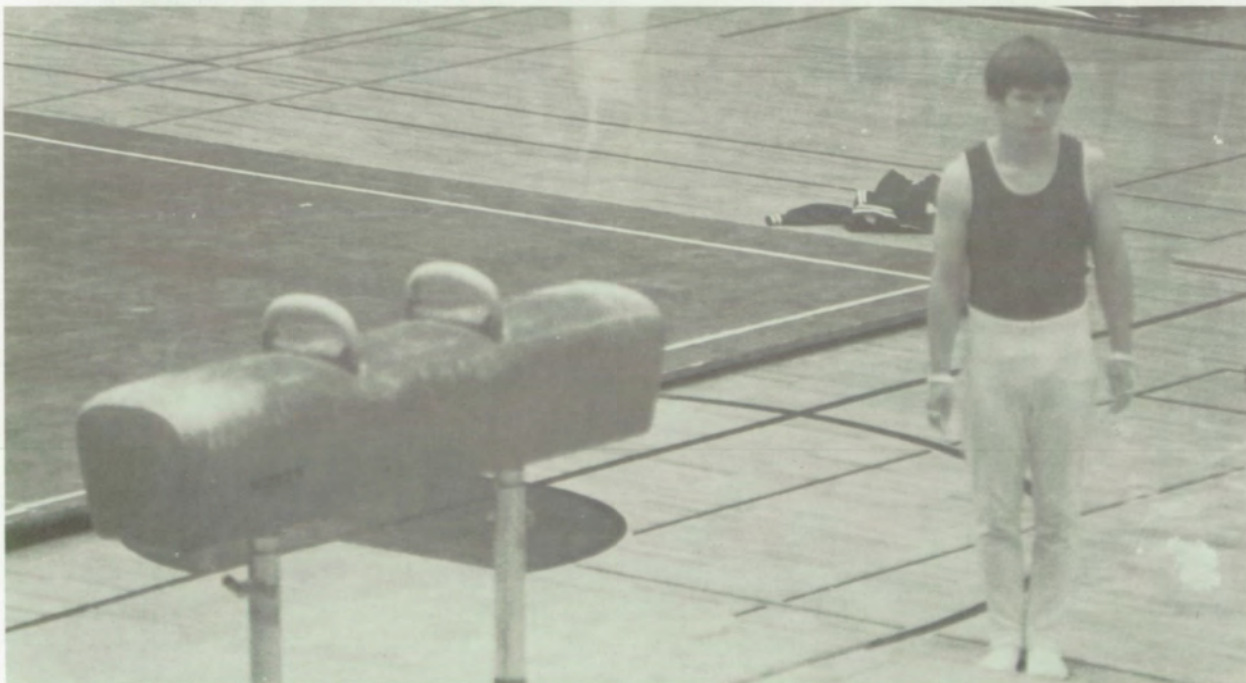

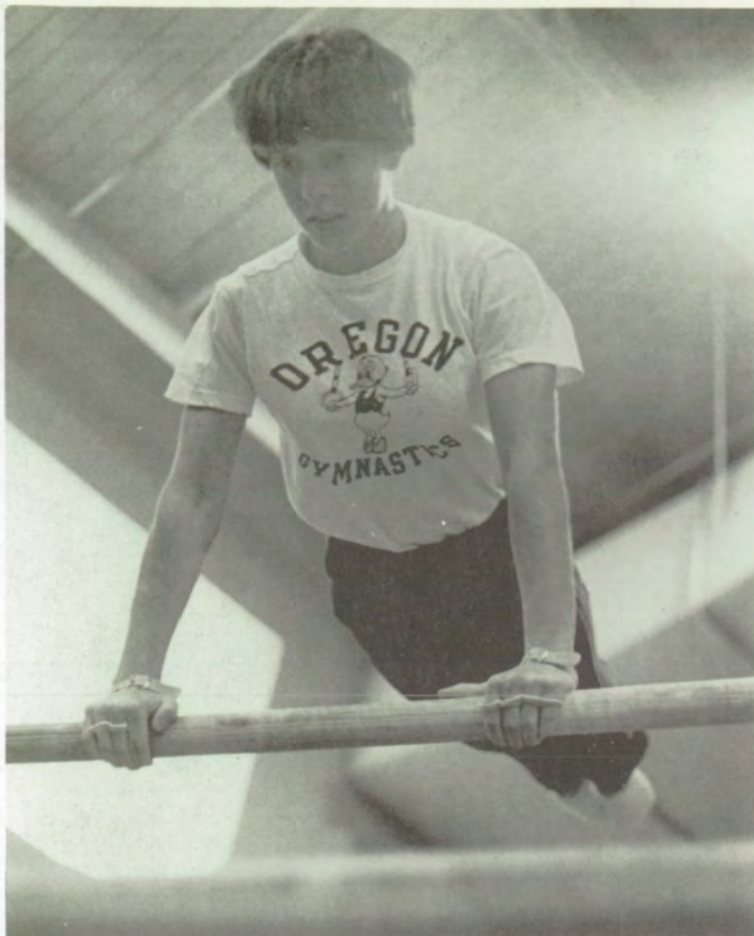


## Girls' Gymnastics

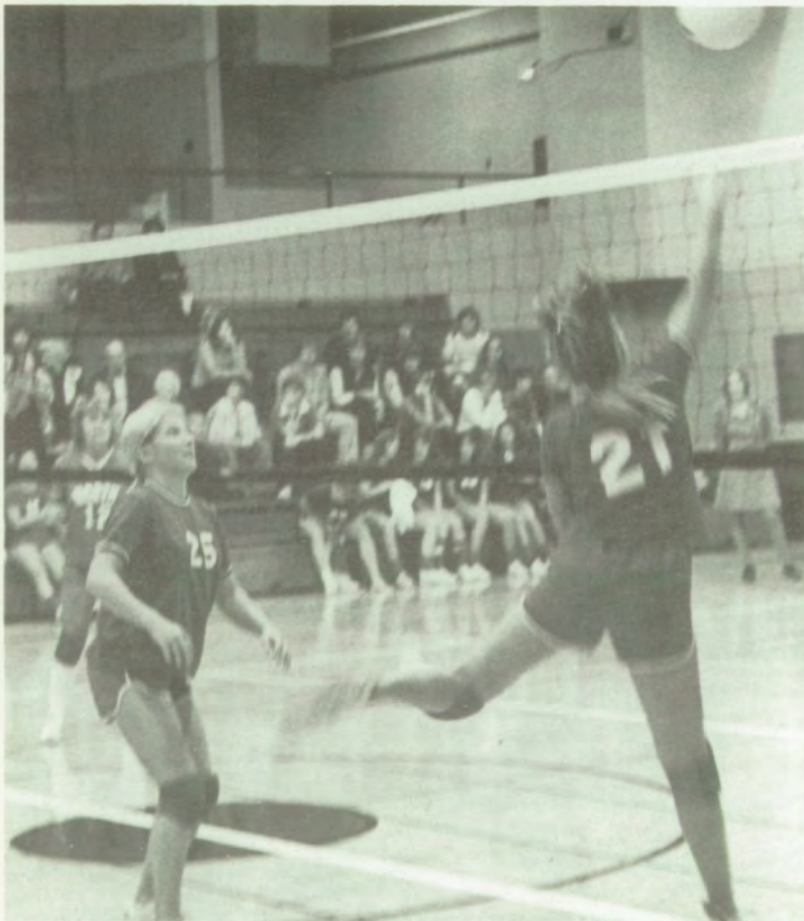

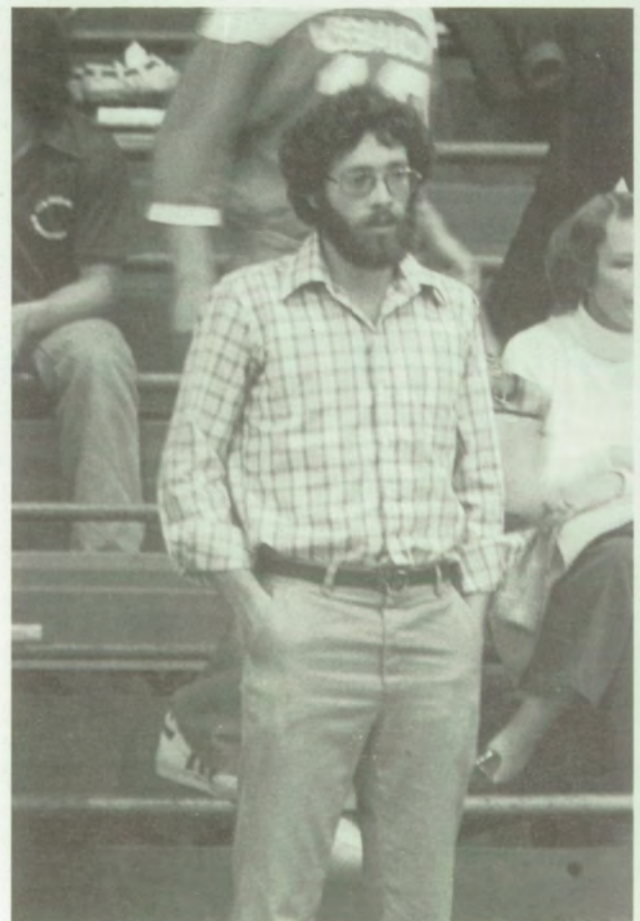

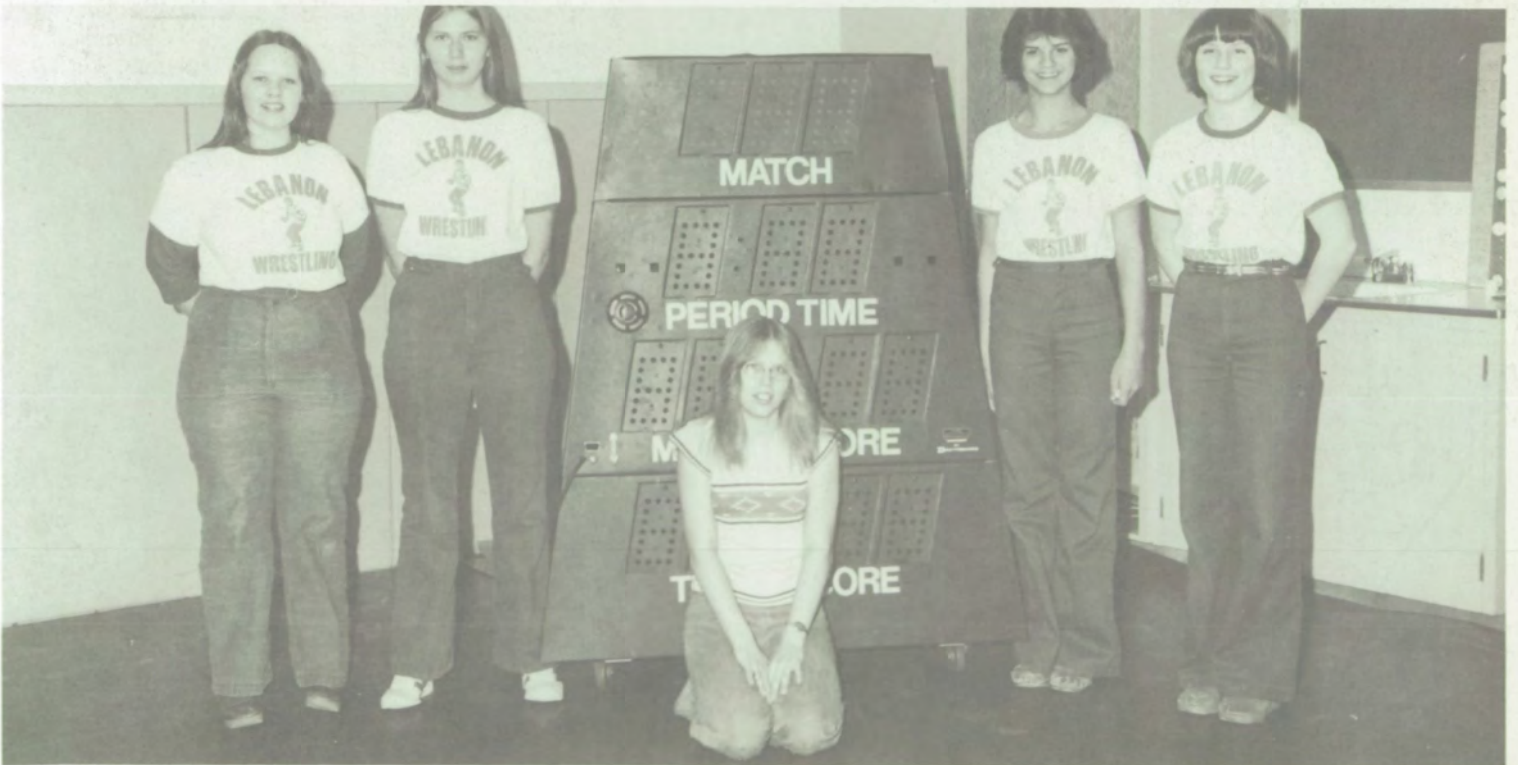

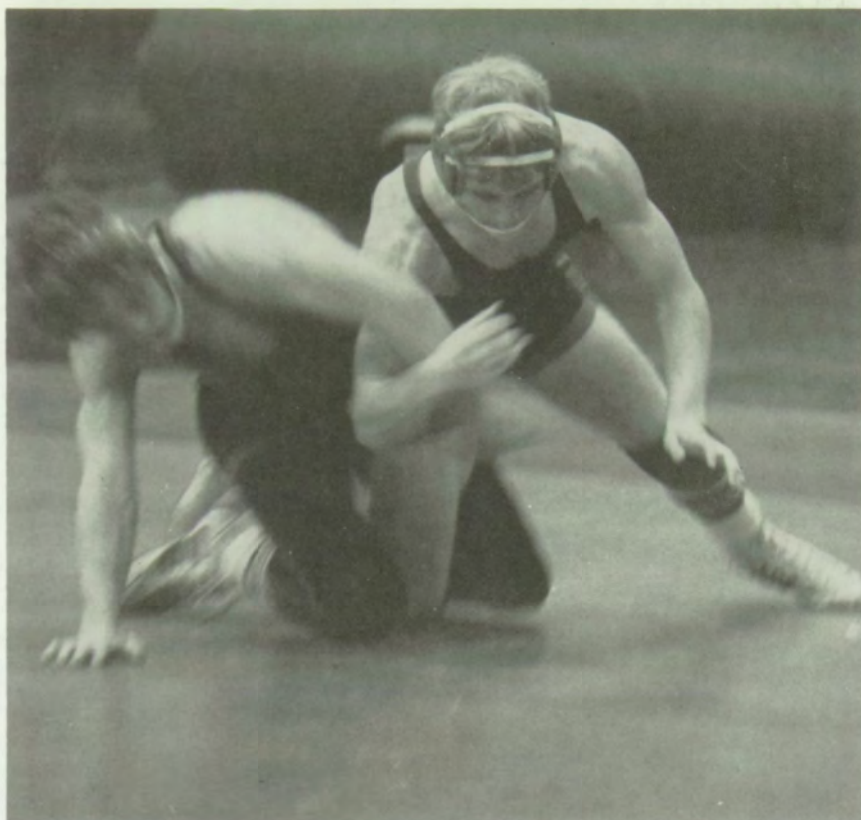
# Varsity Wrestling

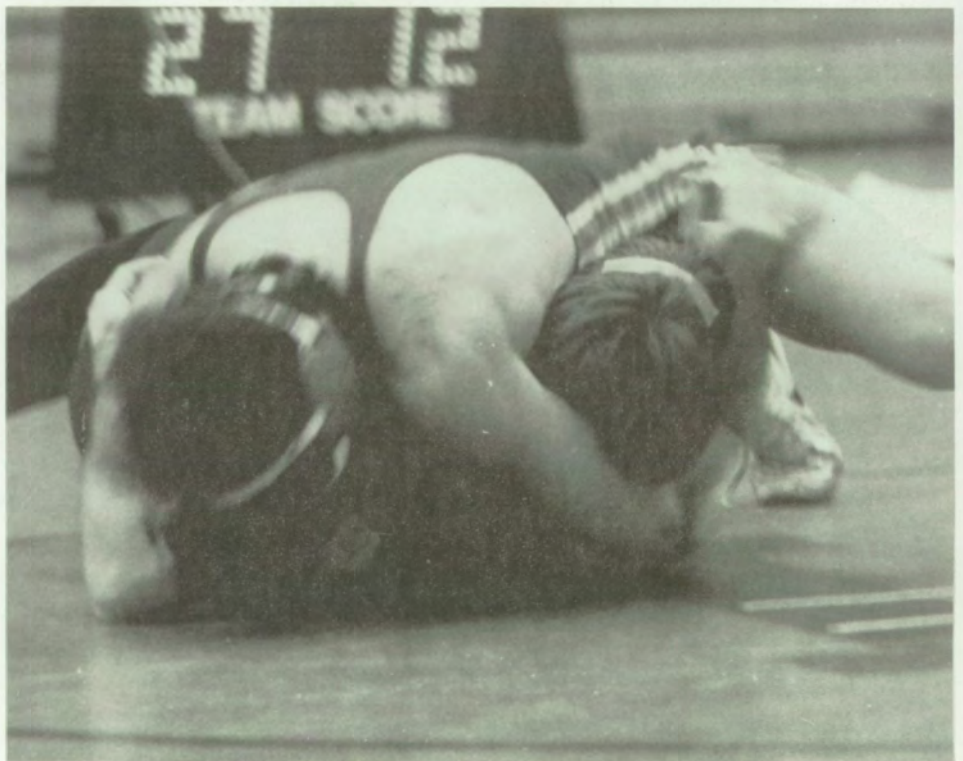
## *Junior Varsity Wrestling*

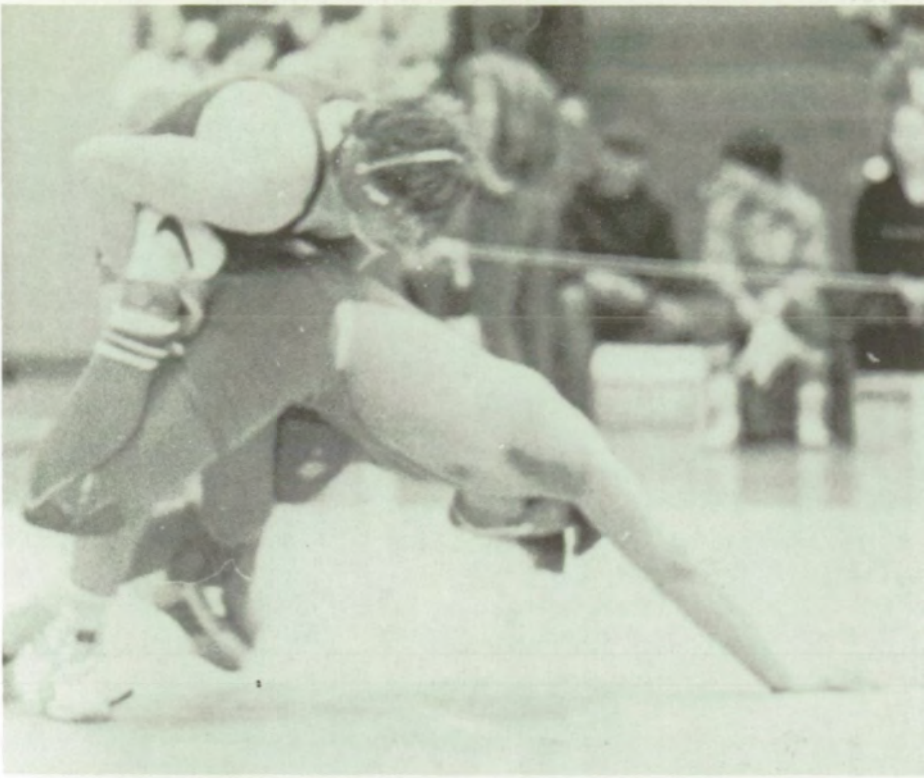

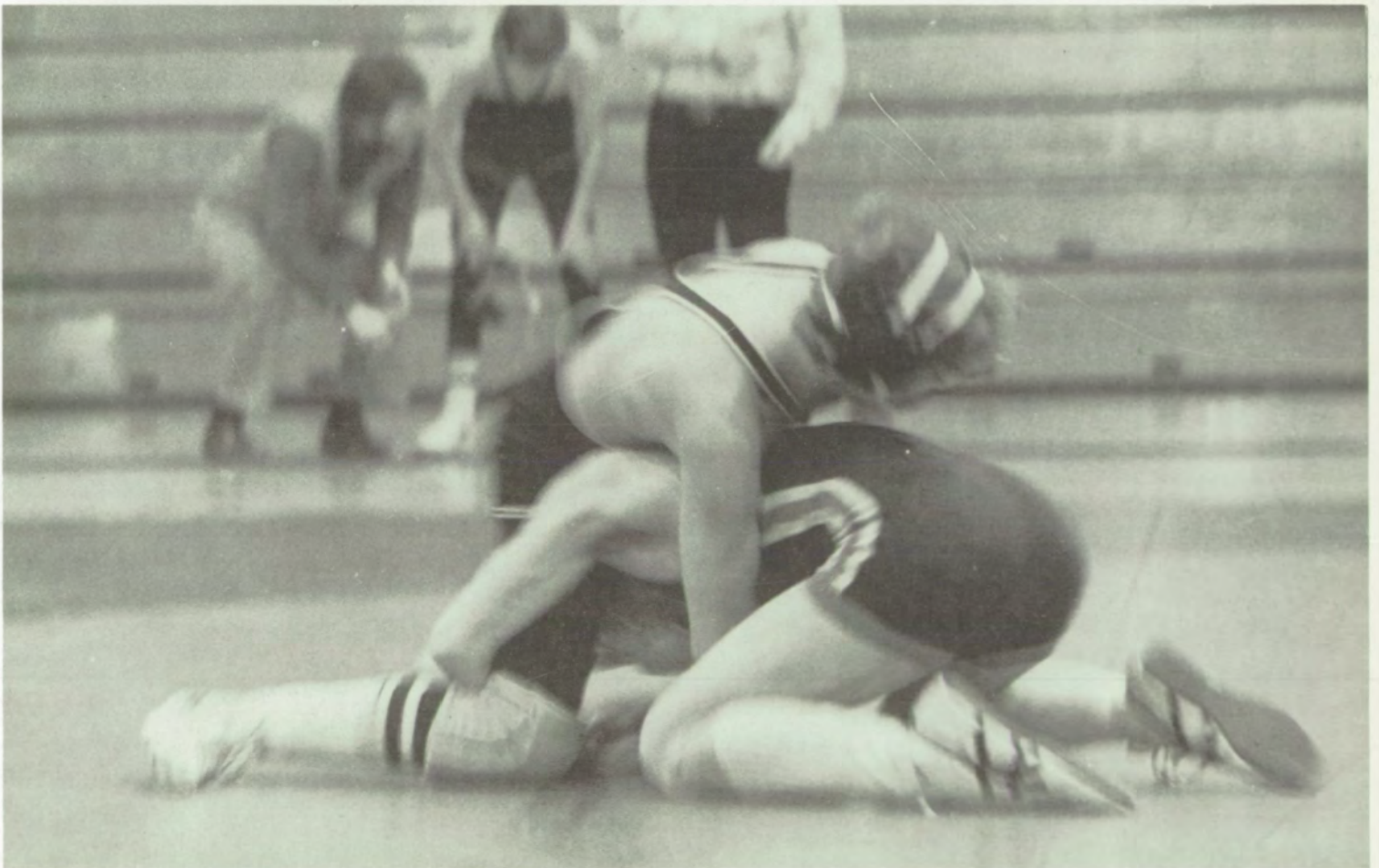
Under Coach Jim Phillips the freshman wrestling team went through a successful season suffering only one loss against Sweet Home.

"The Pit" was a major factor for the Warriors as they went undefeated at home, except for the annual Corvallis jinx game. Hints of Ron Lee, Mike

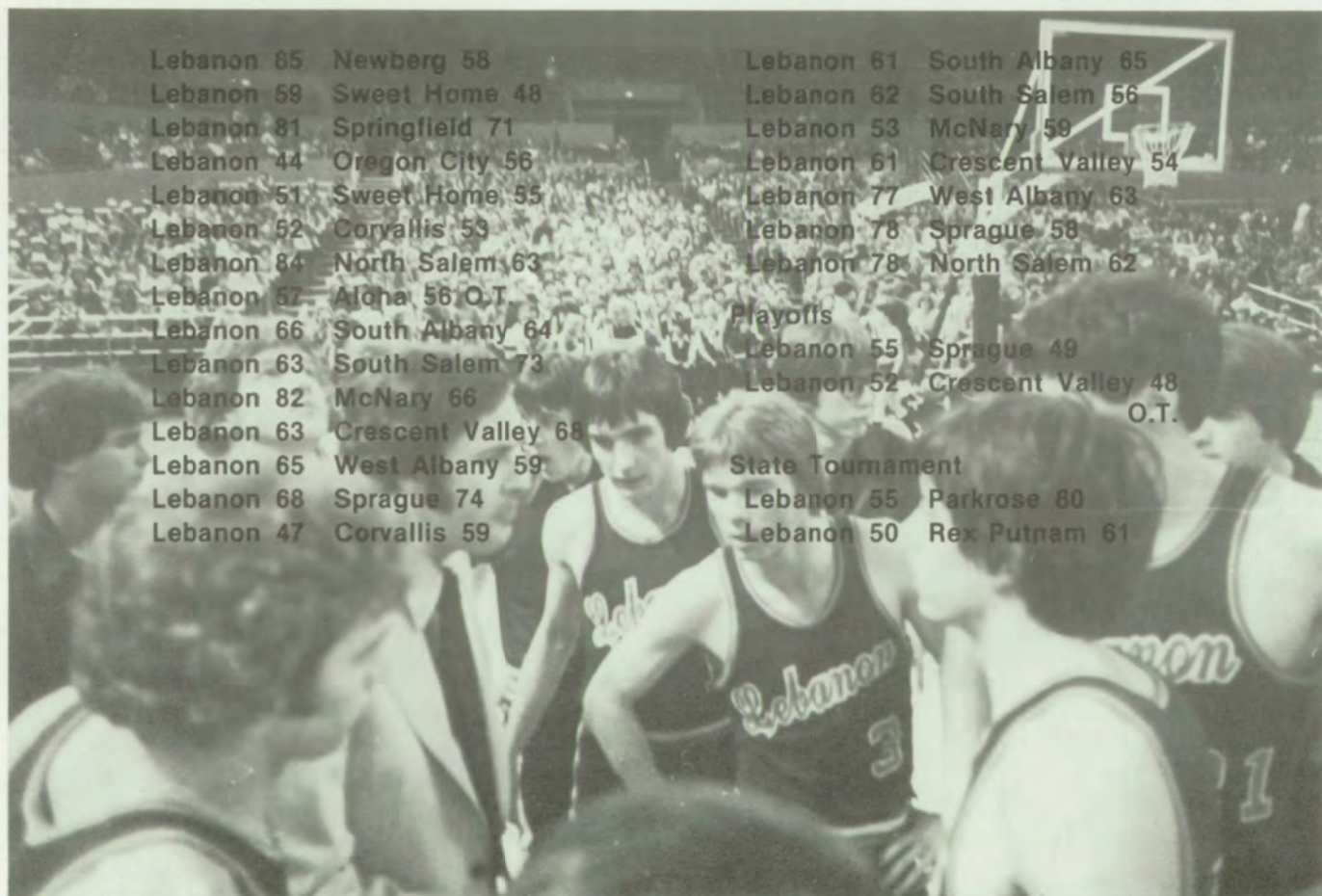
Drummond and Greg Ballard were seen in the aggressive style play of the hustling varsity team.

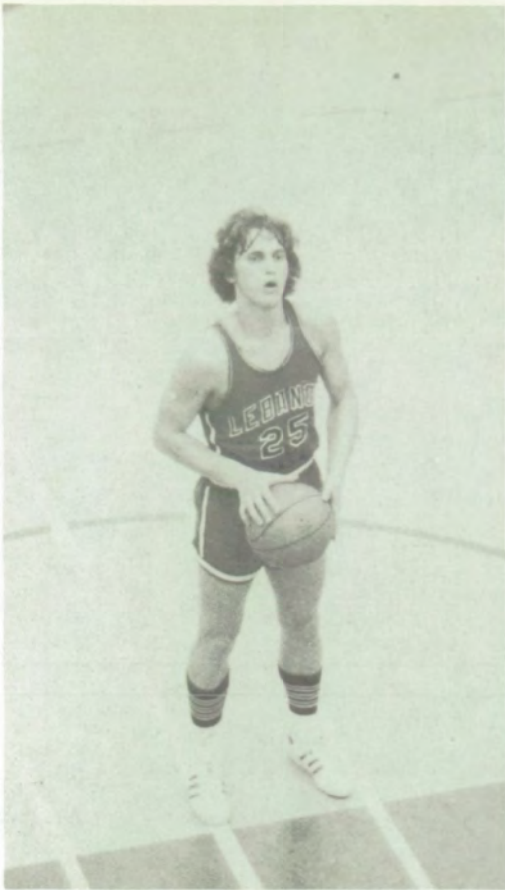

The sophomore basketball team coached by Mr. Dean Cole went through a tough season and ended with a 10-10 overall record.

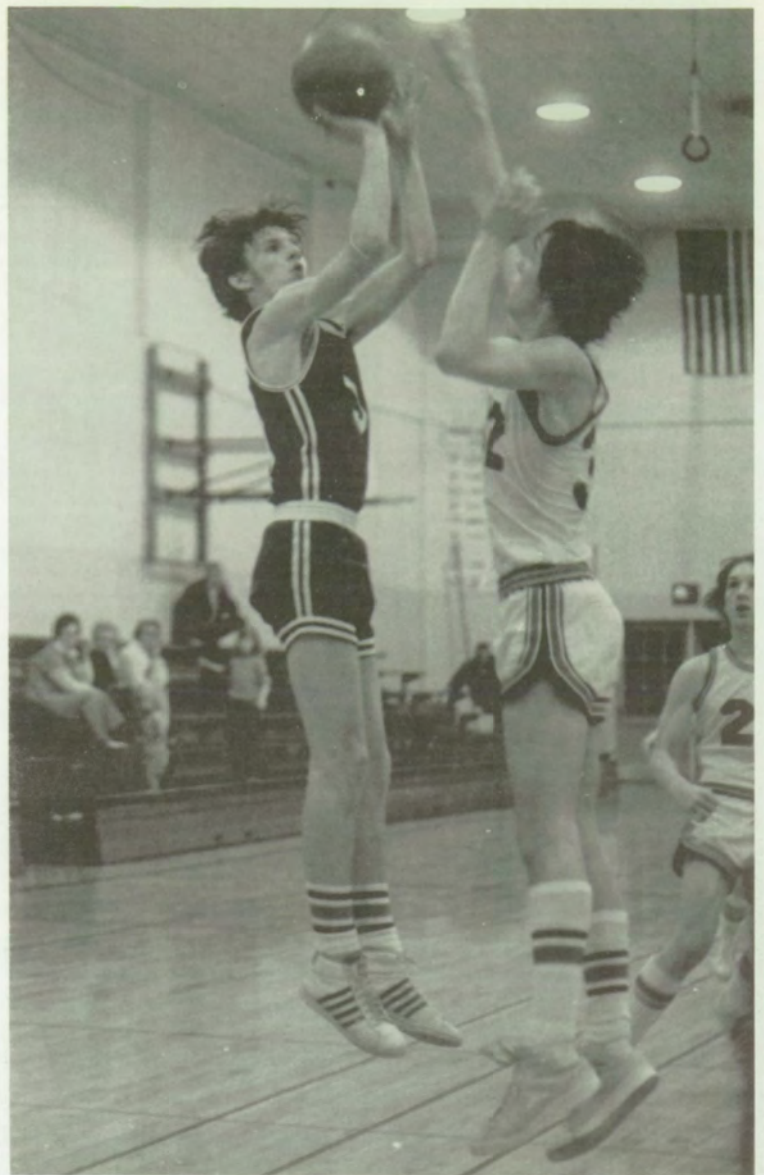
The Scouts started the season going 4-0 in league but couldn't keep up that consistency in league play.

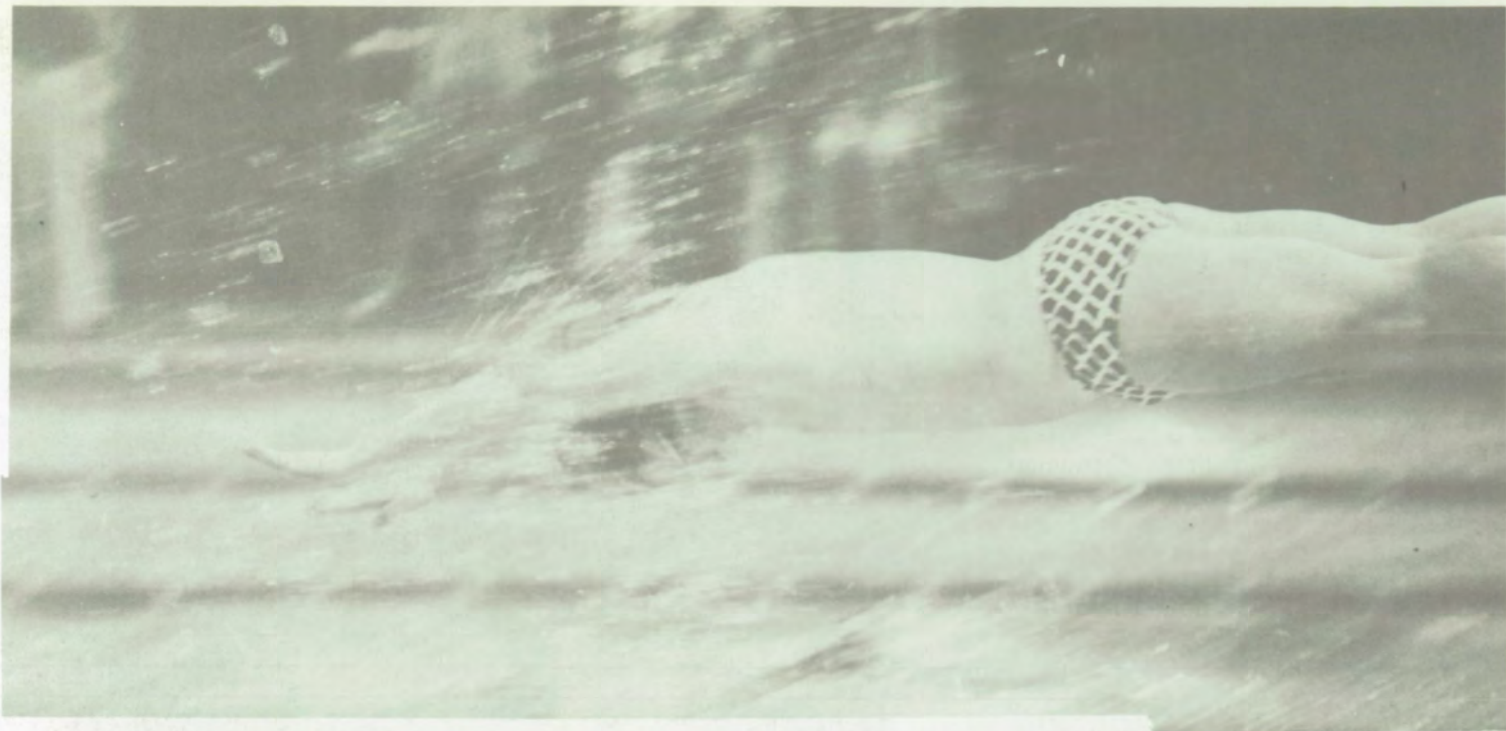

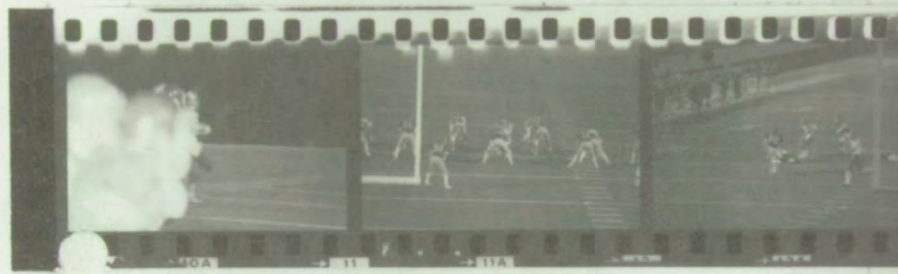

A highlight of the club's activities was a guest "speaker" who came in and showed club members the techniques of sign language.



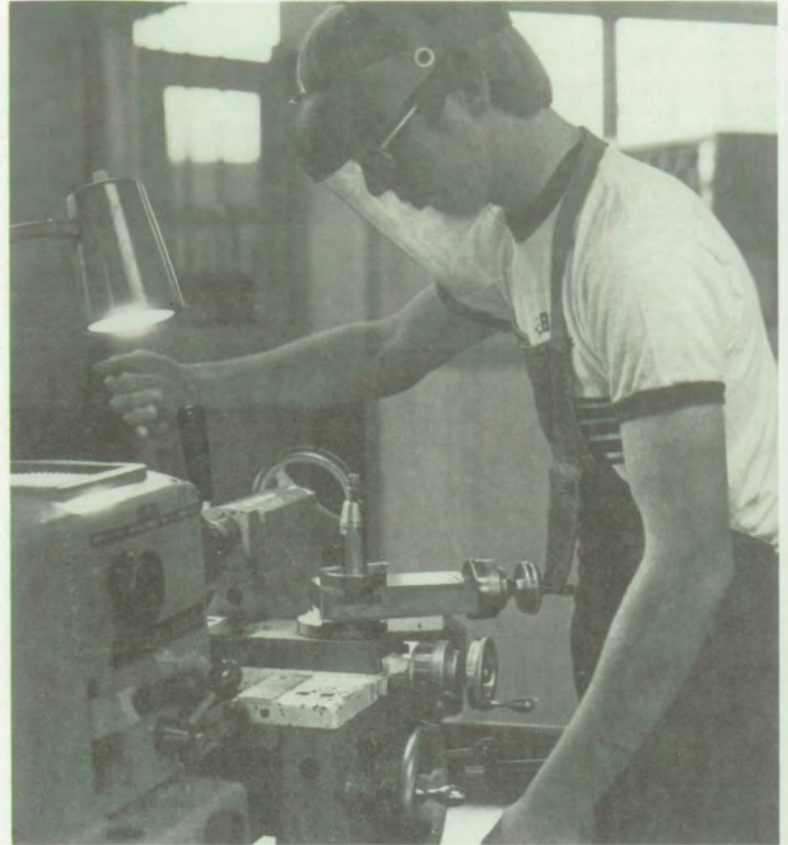

In-flight experience was given by advisor and licensed pilot John Foster. Field trips to airports and aircraft shops helped to round-out each club members' experience in the aviation field.



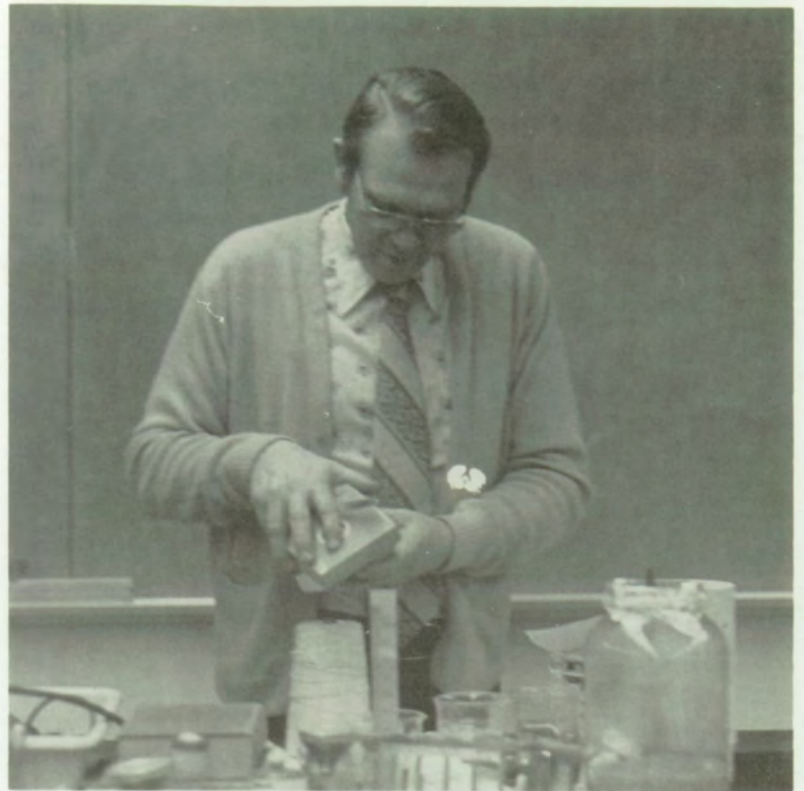

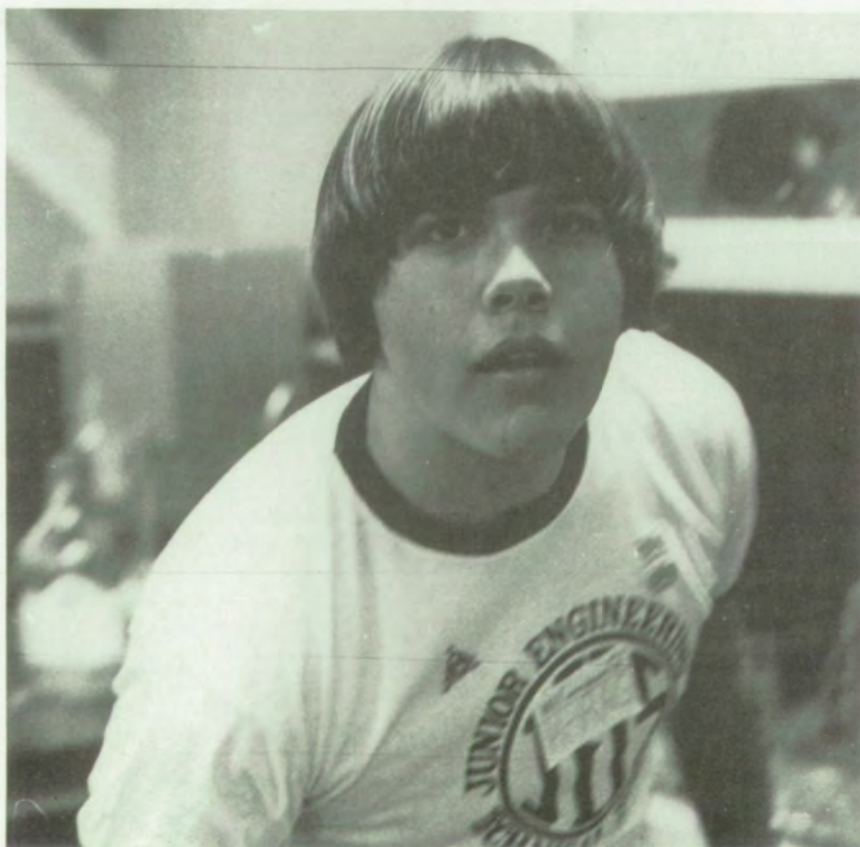
