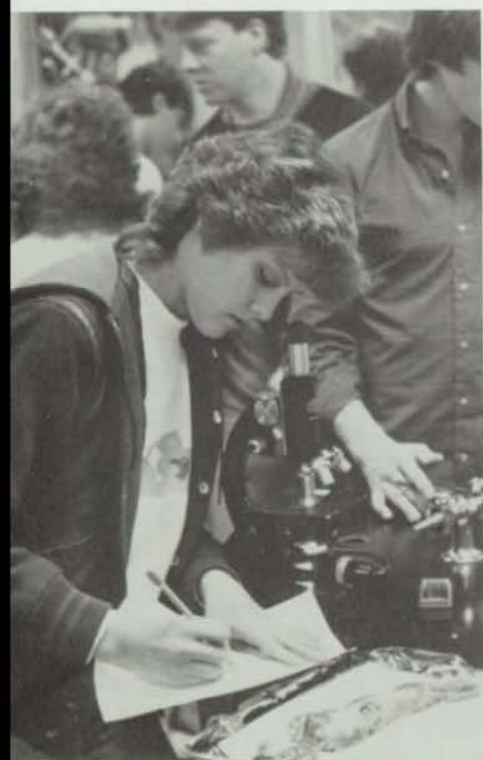


to the future

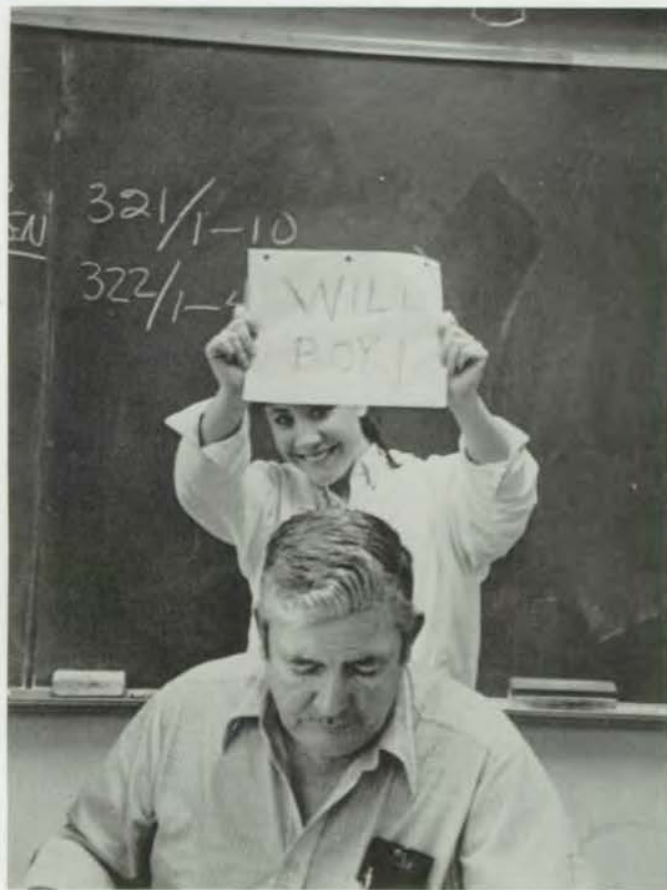

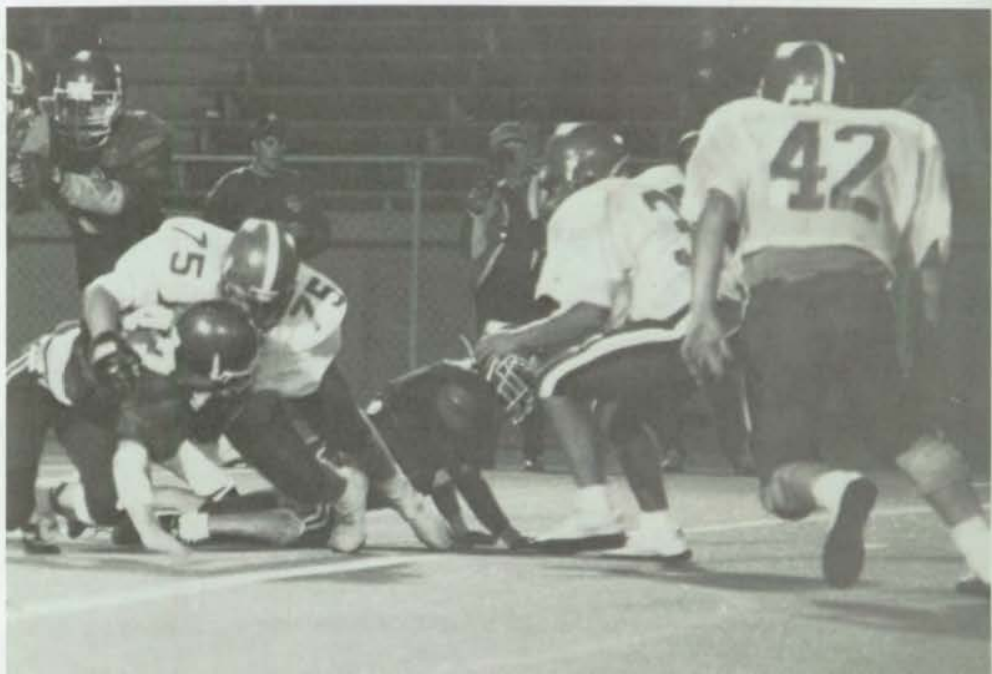

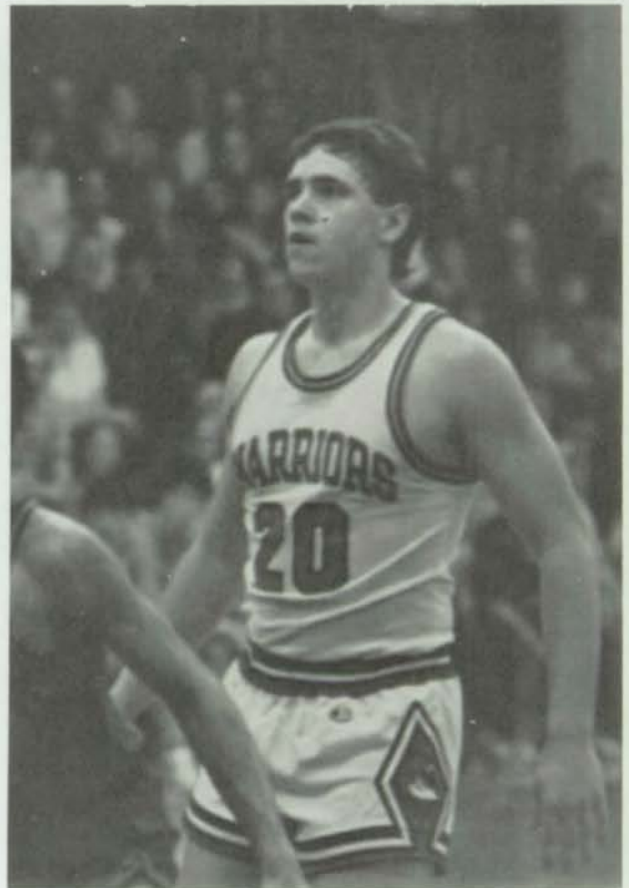

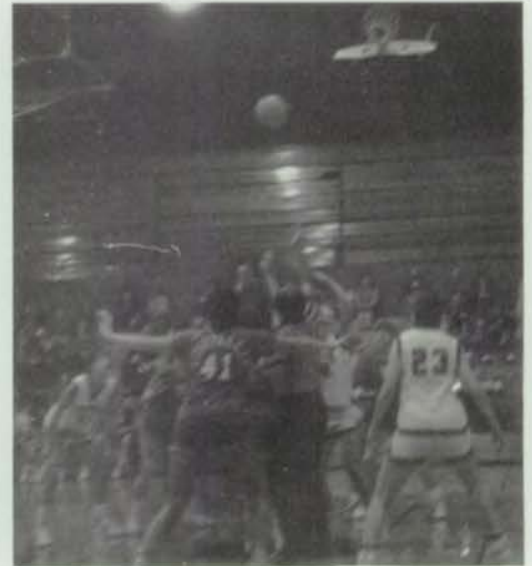

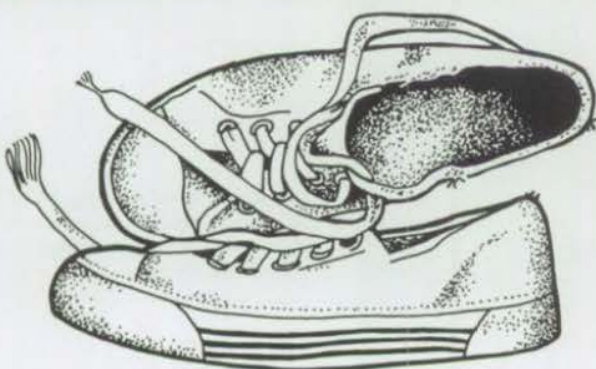

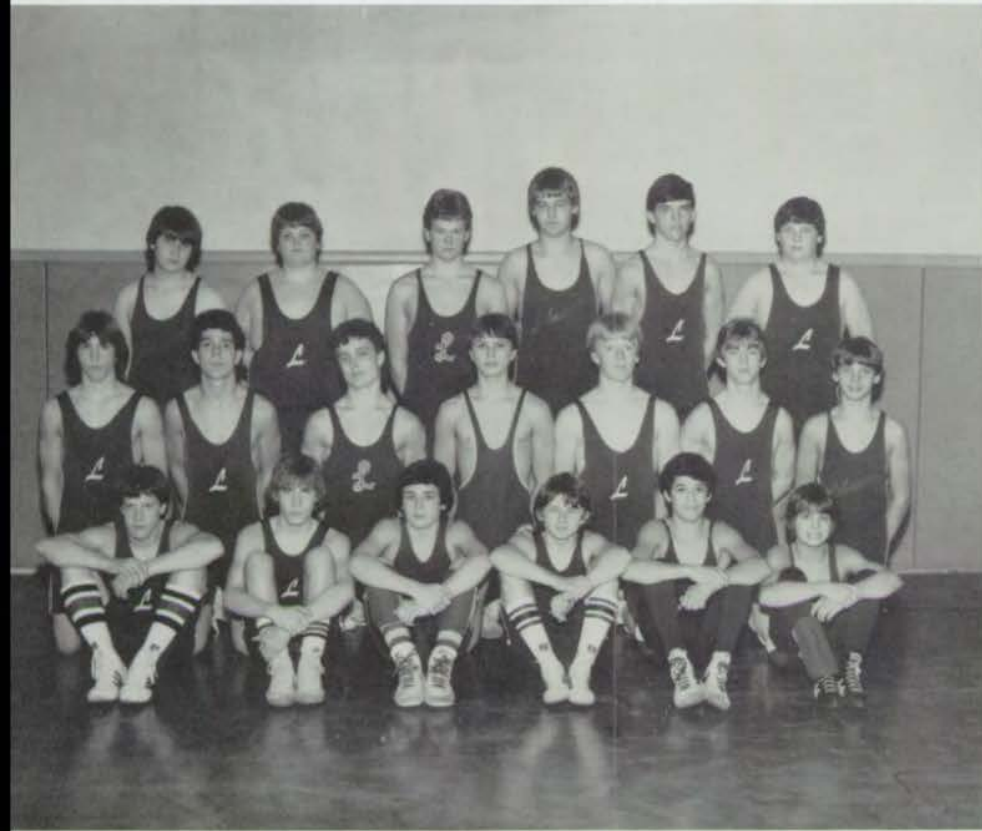

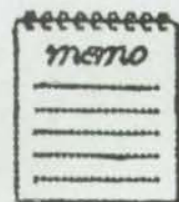

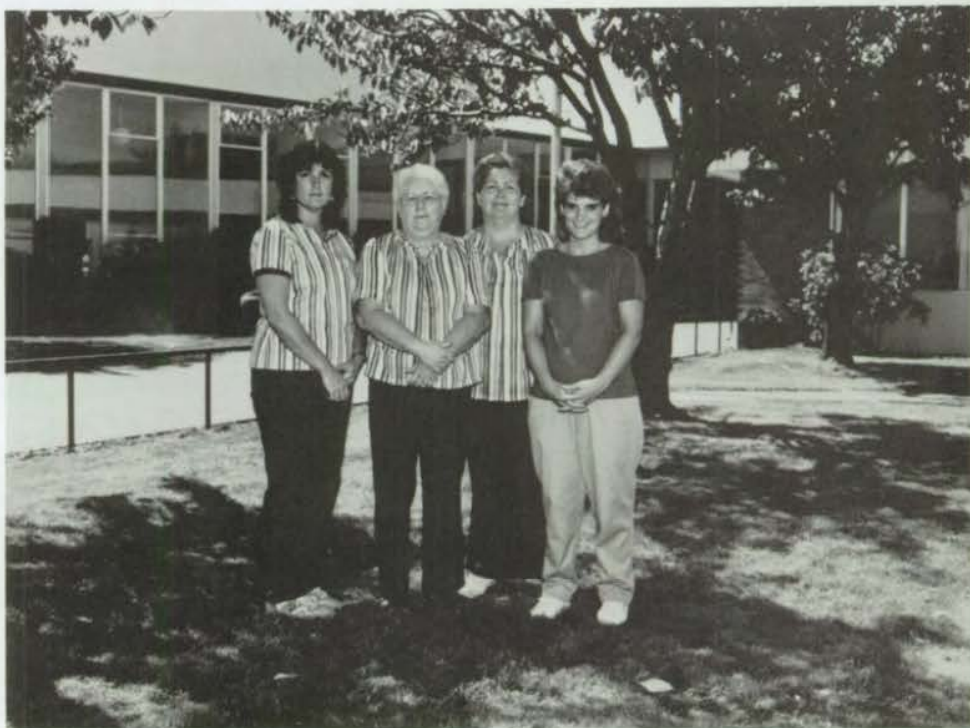
Food for thought

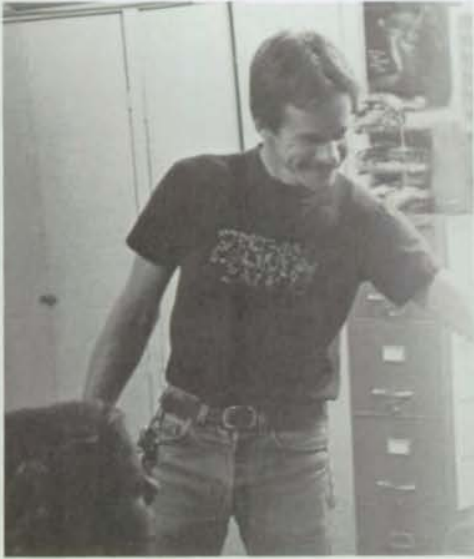

Custodians

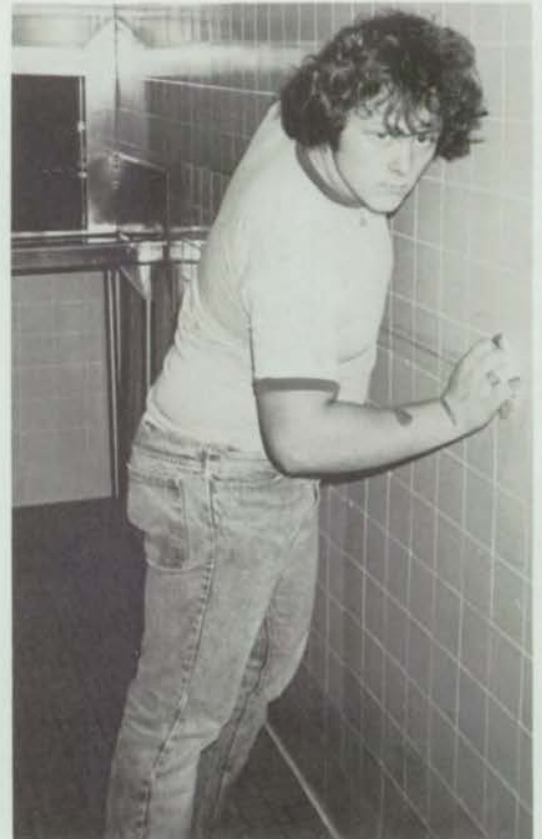

Homecoming

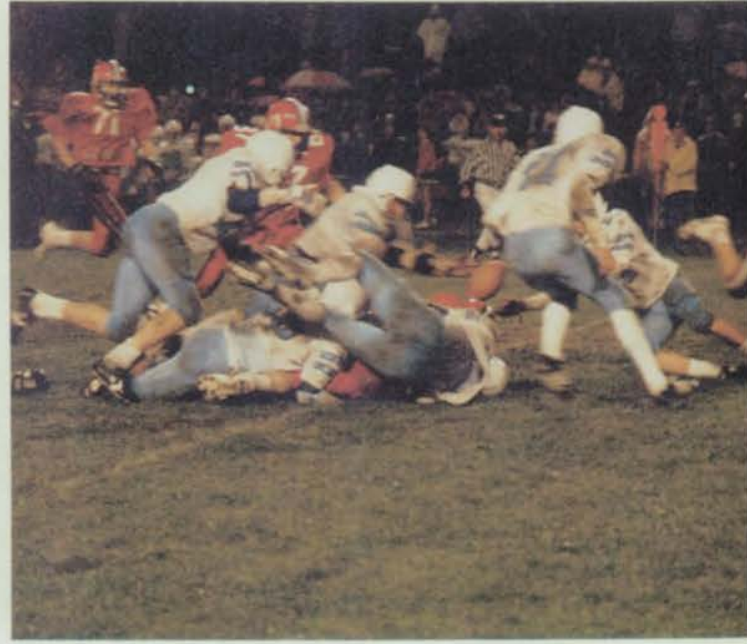
