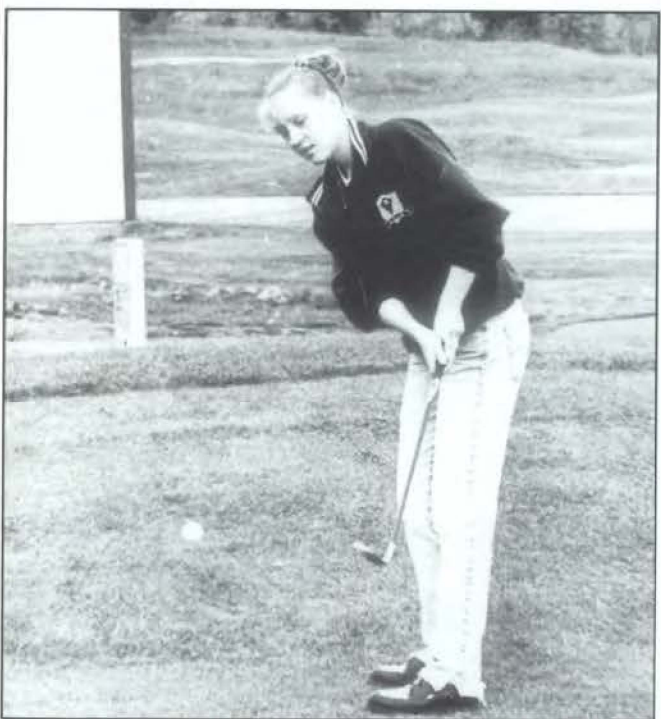

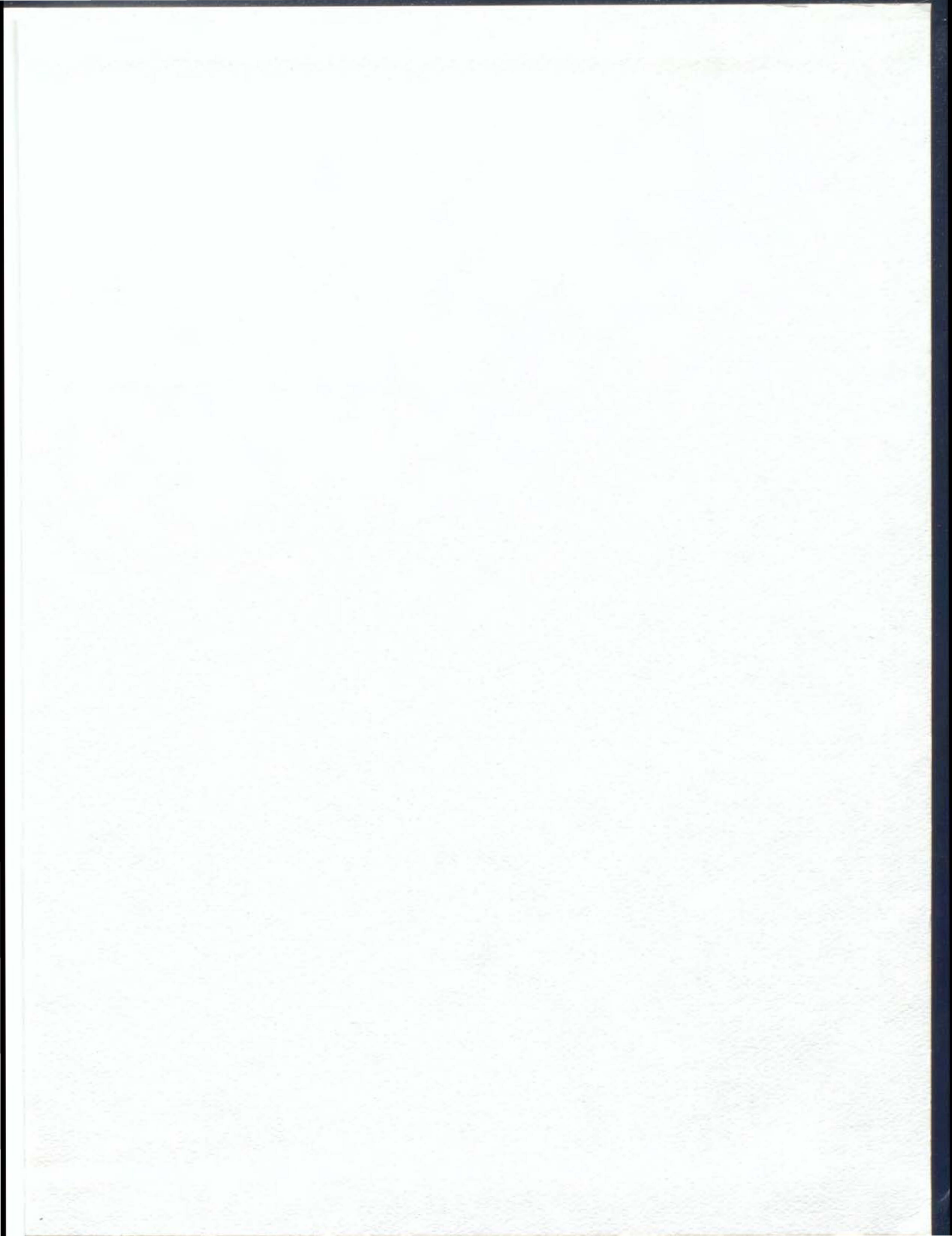

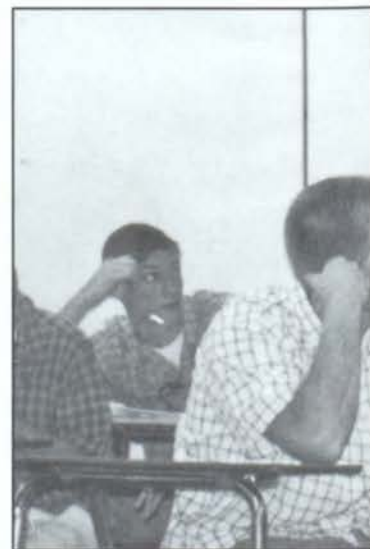

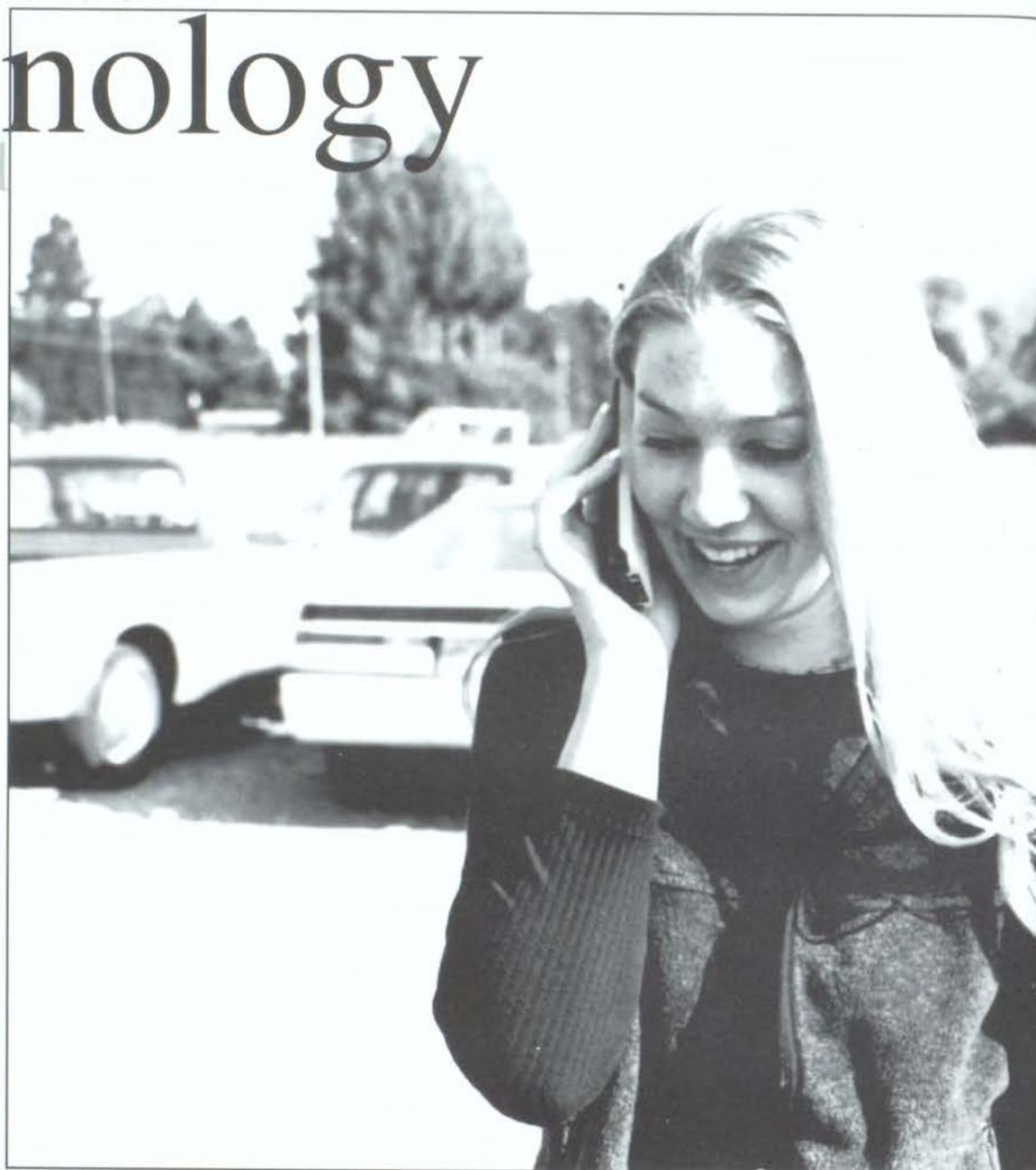

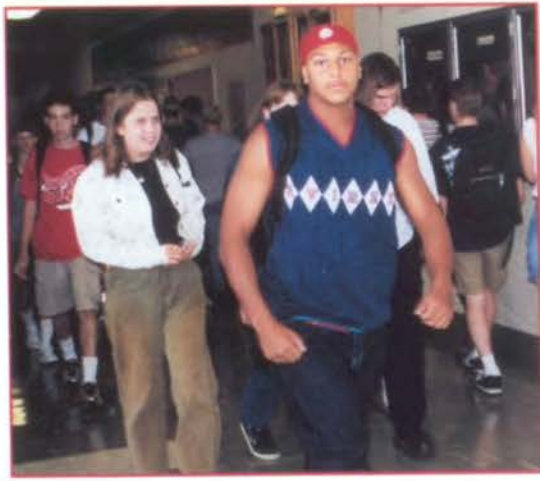

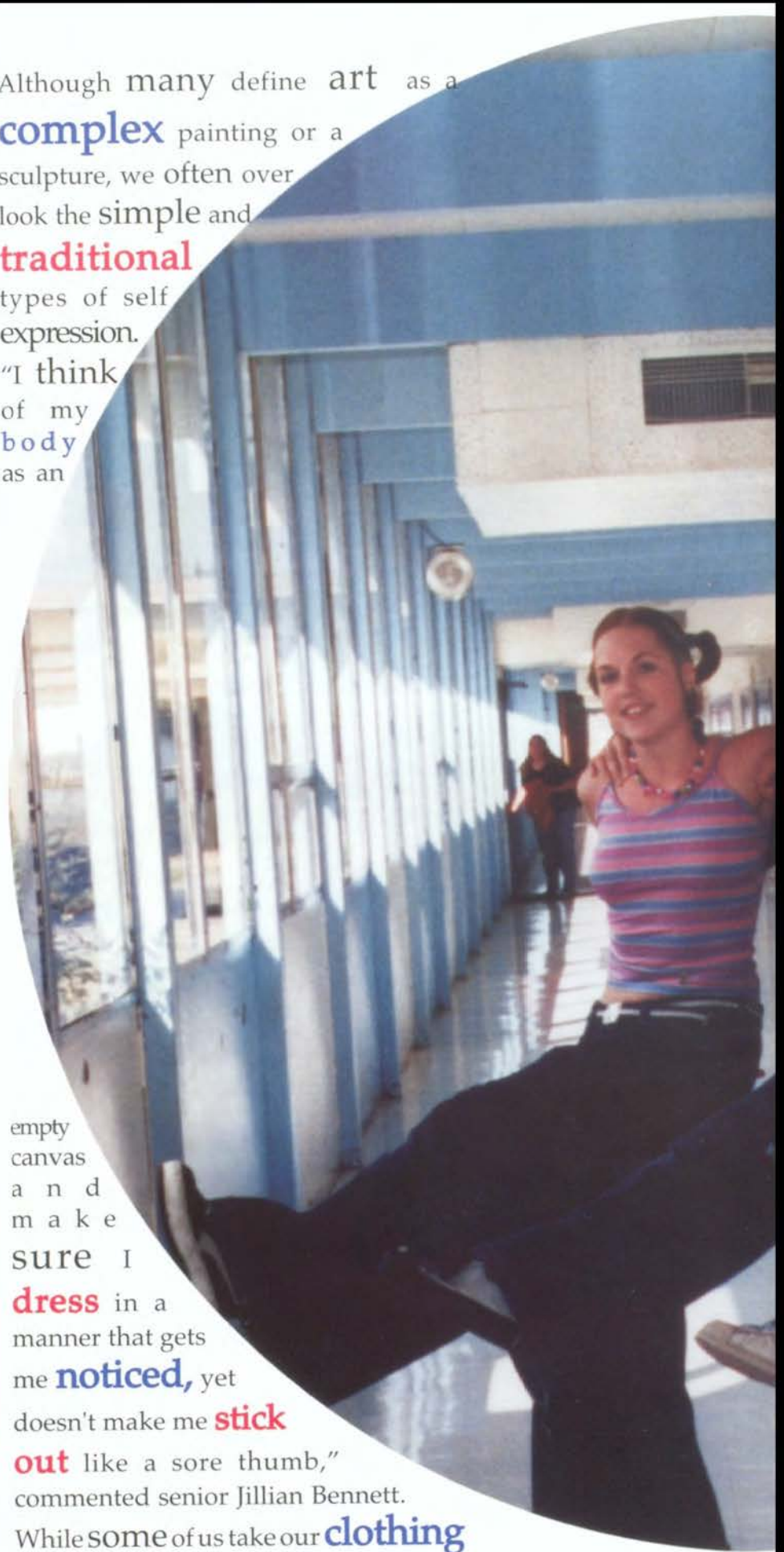

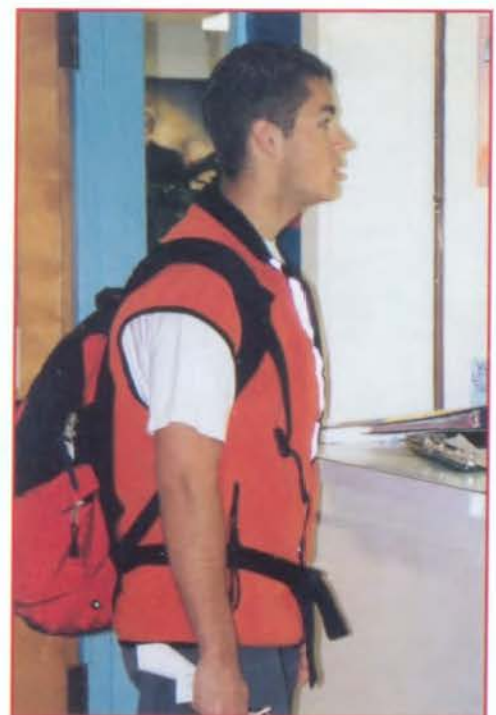

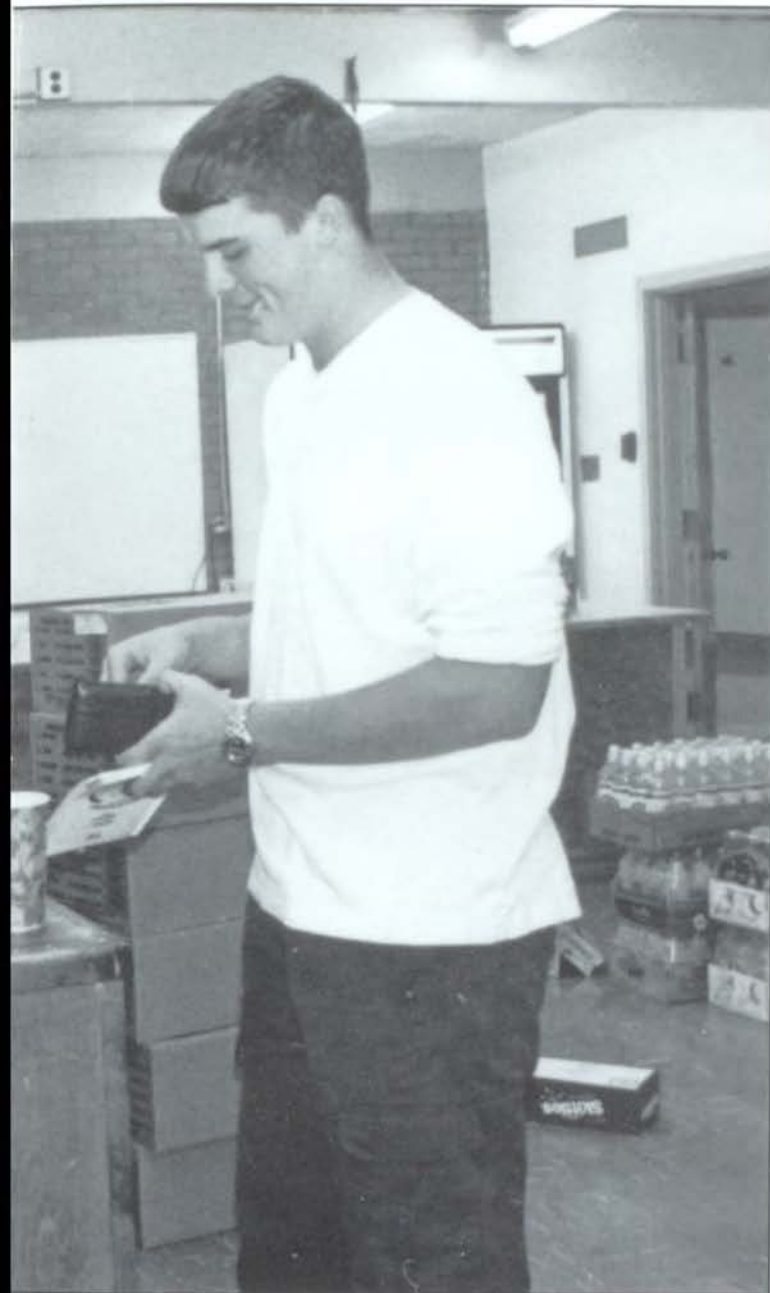

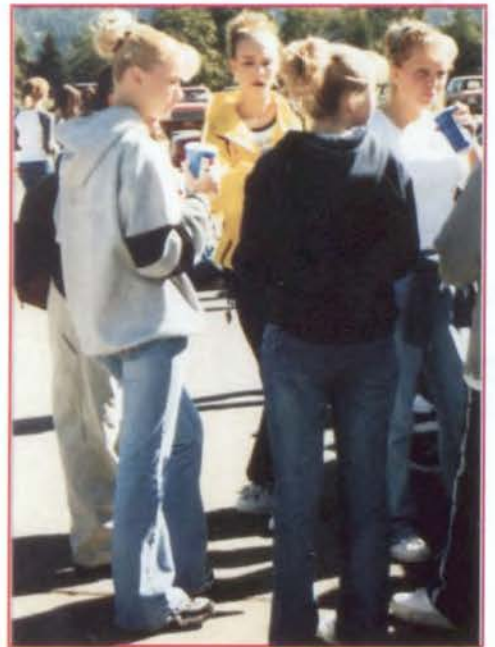

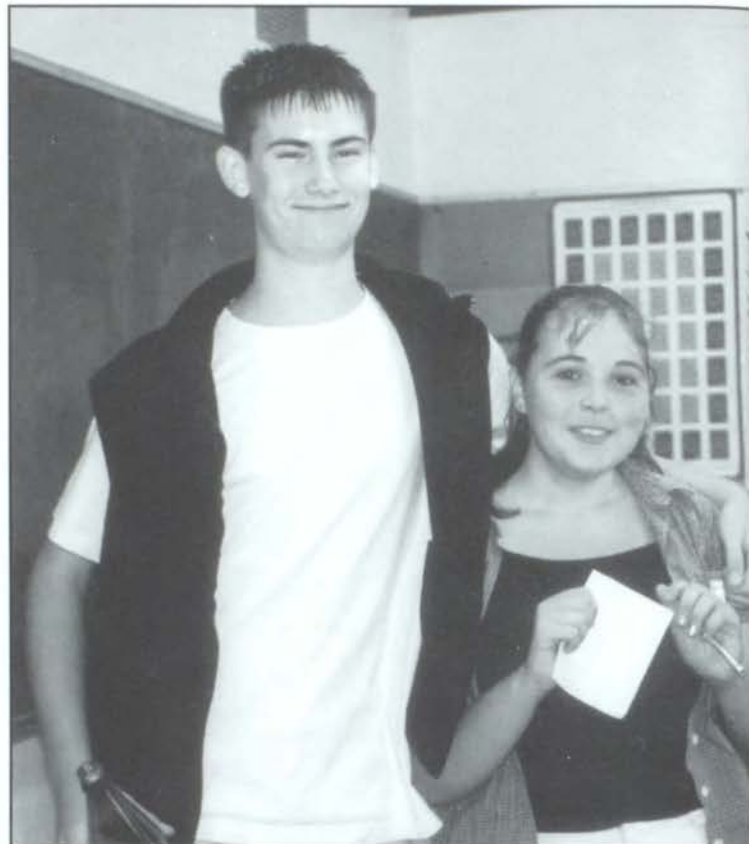

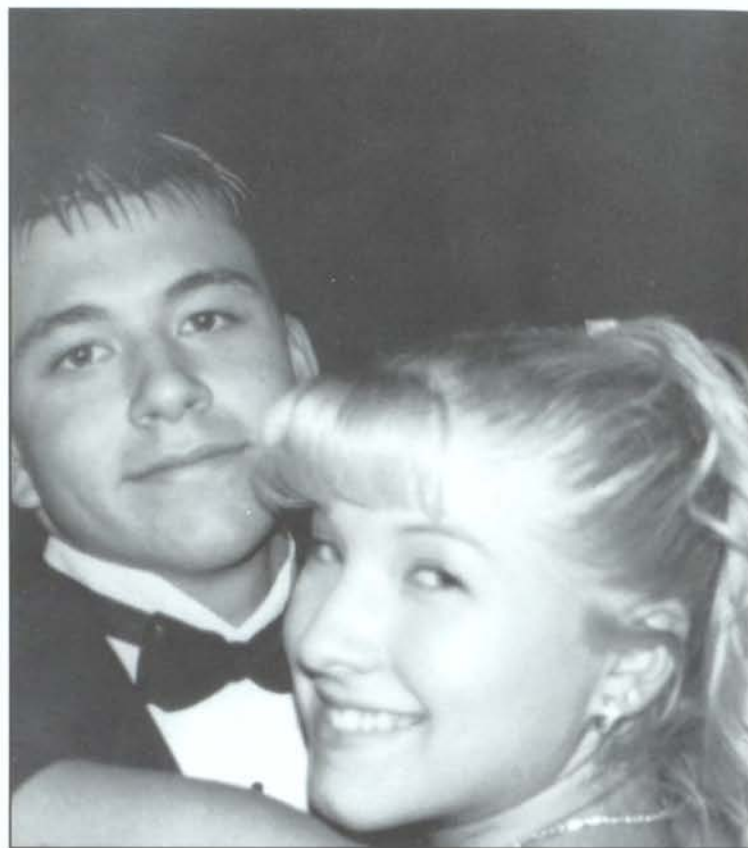

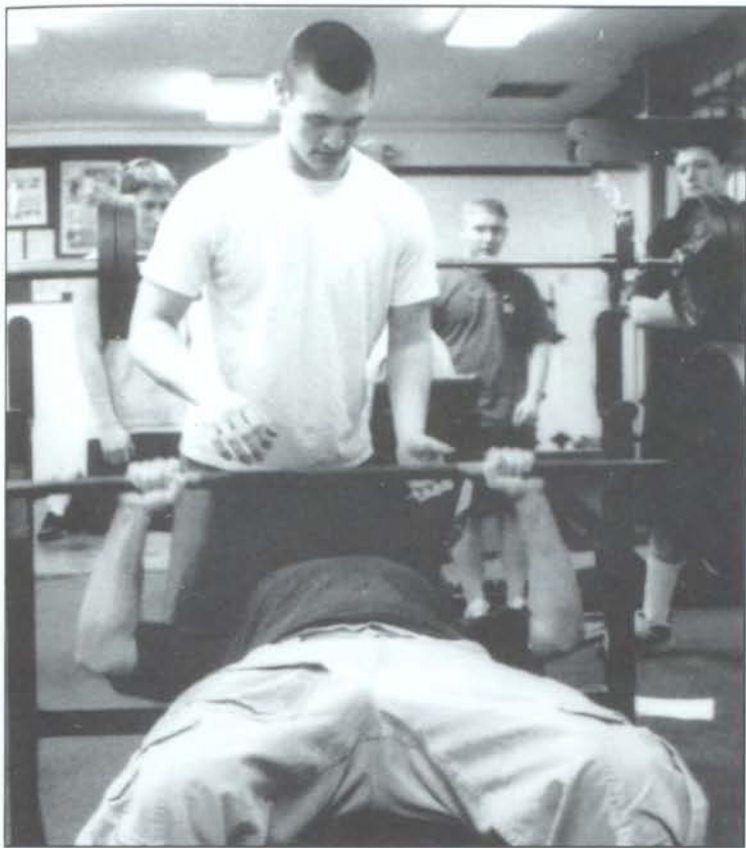

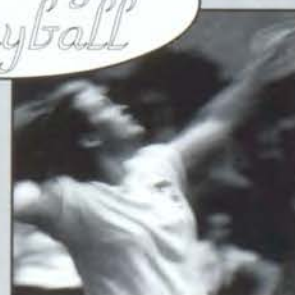

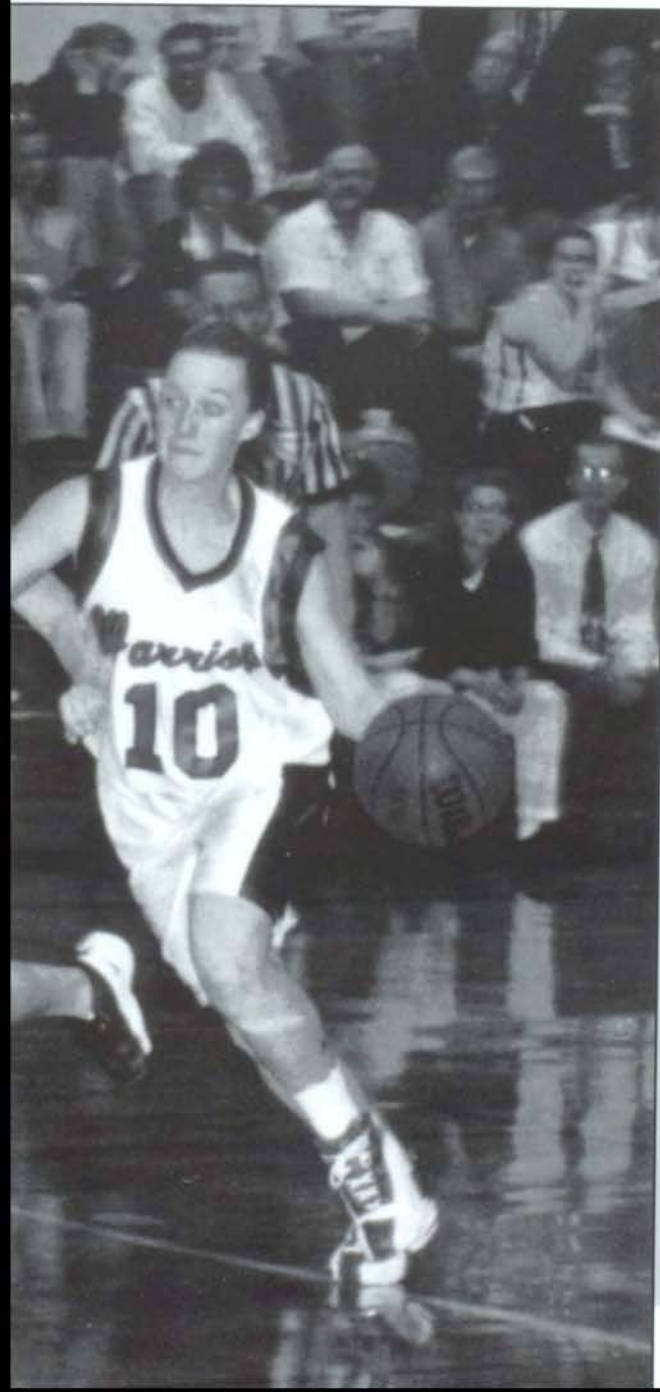

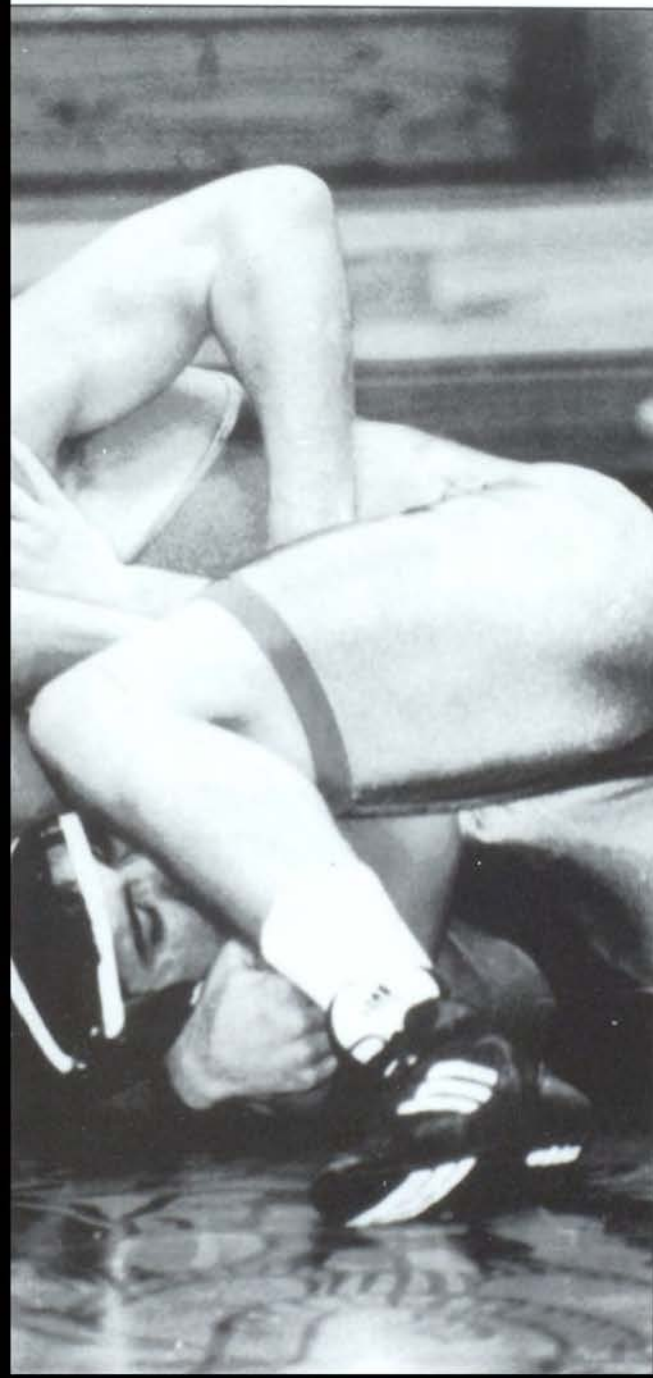

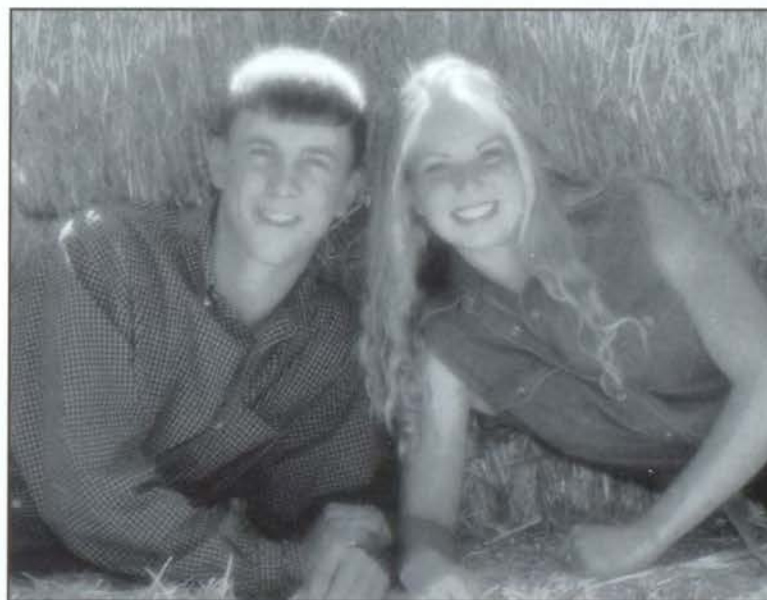

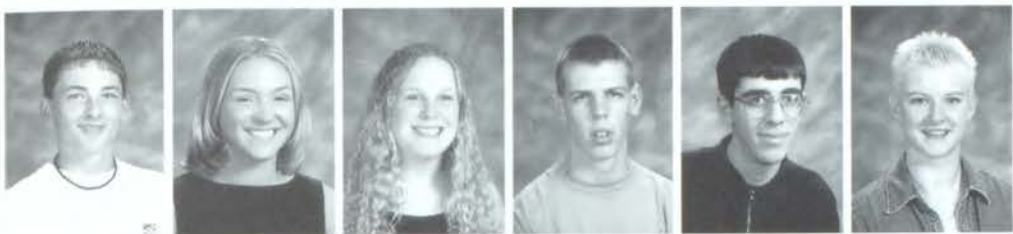

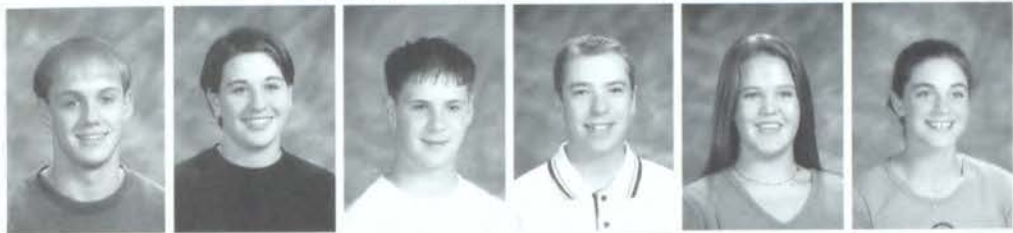

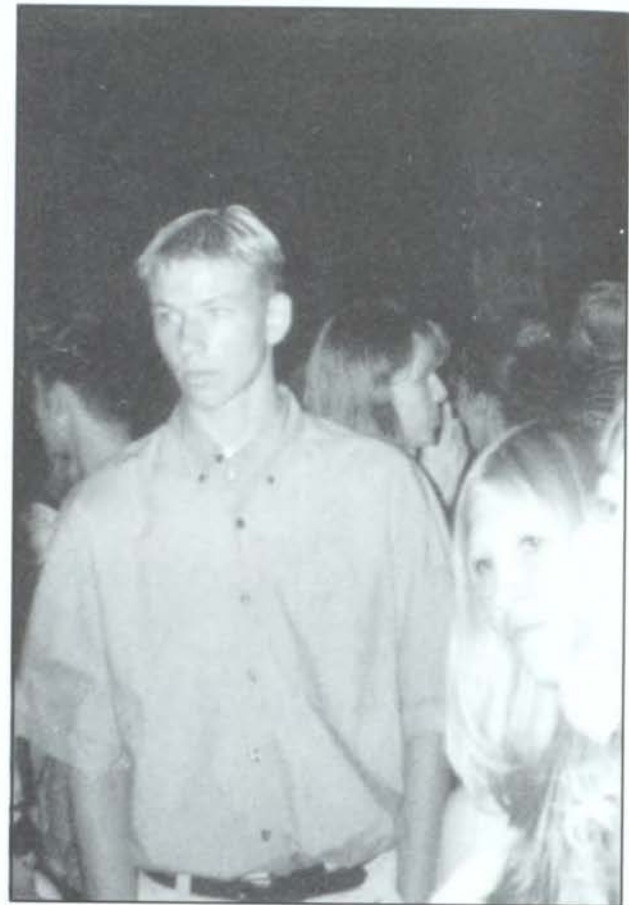

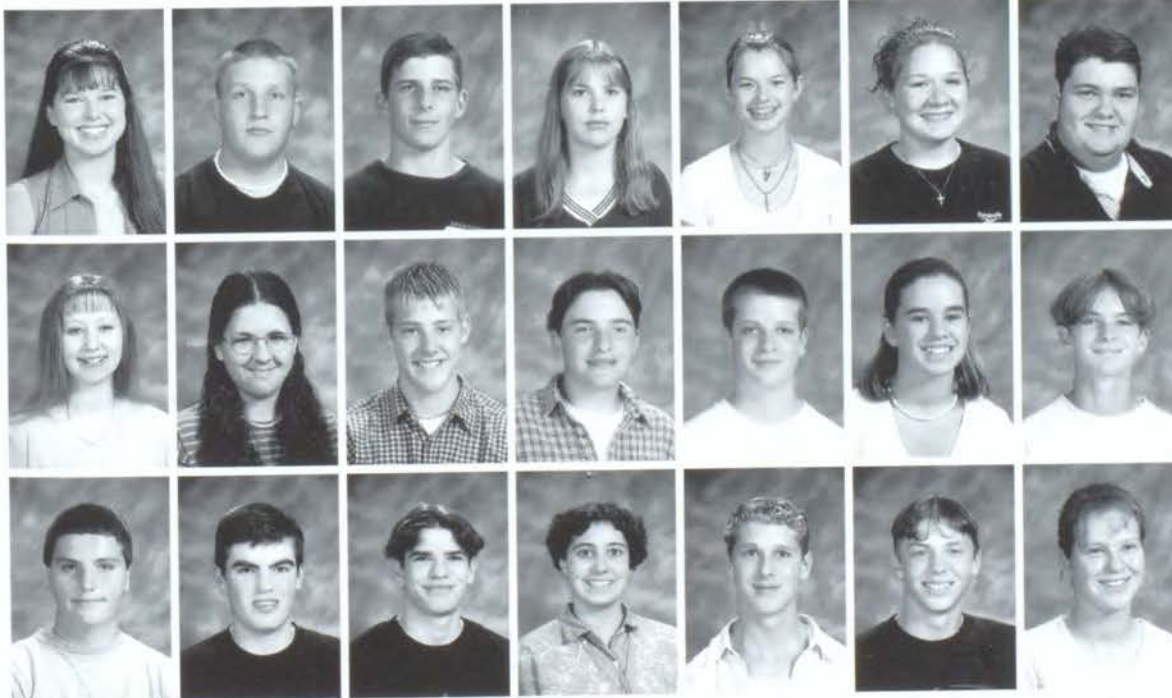

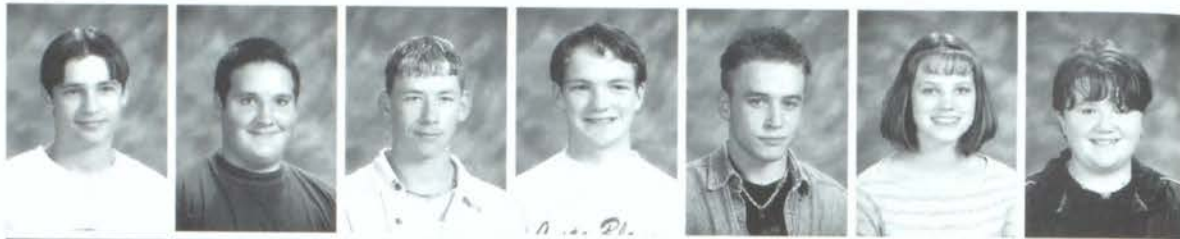

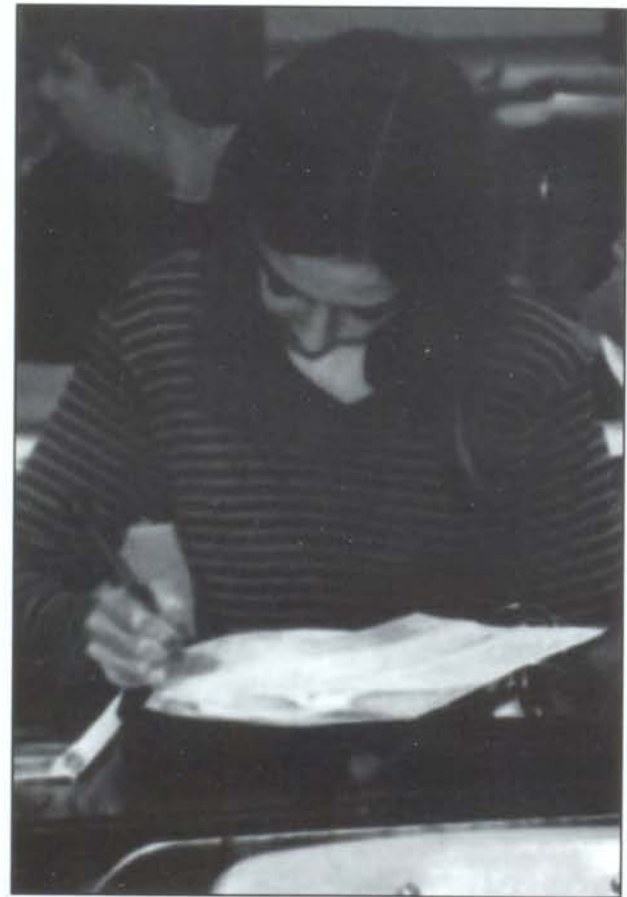

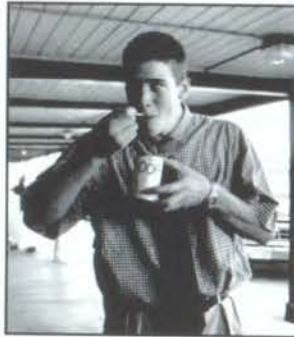

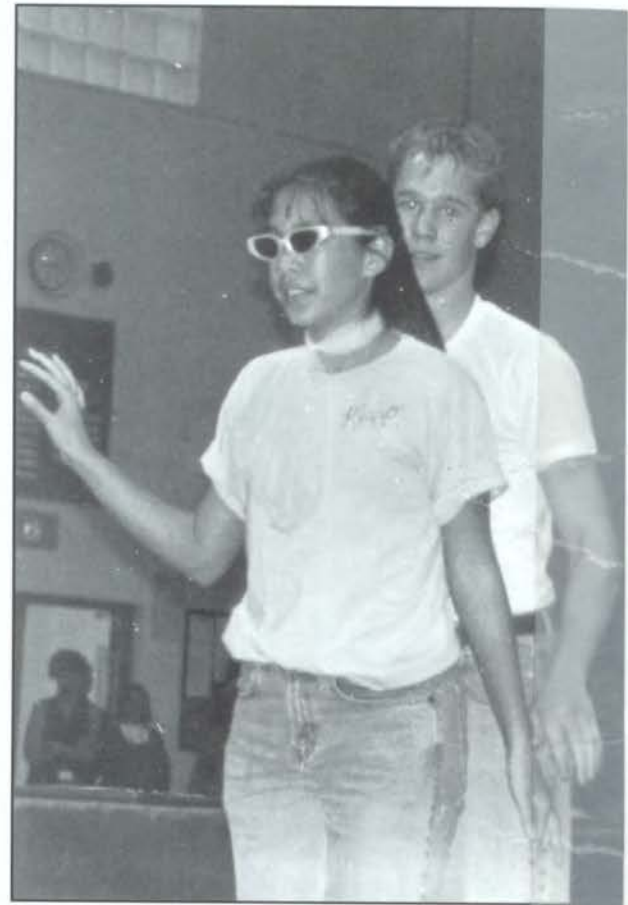

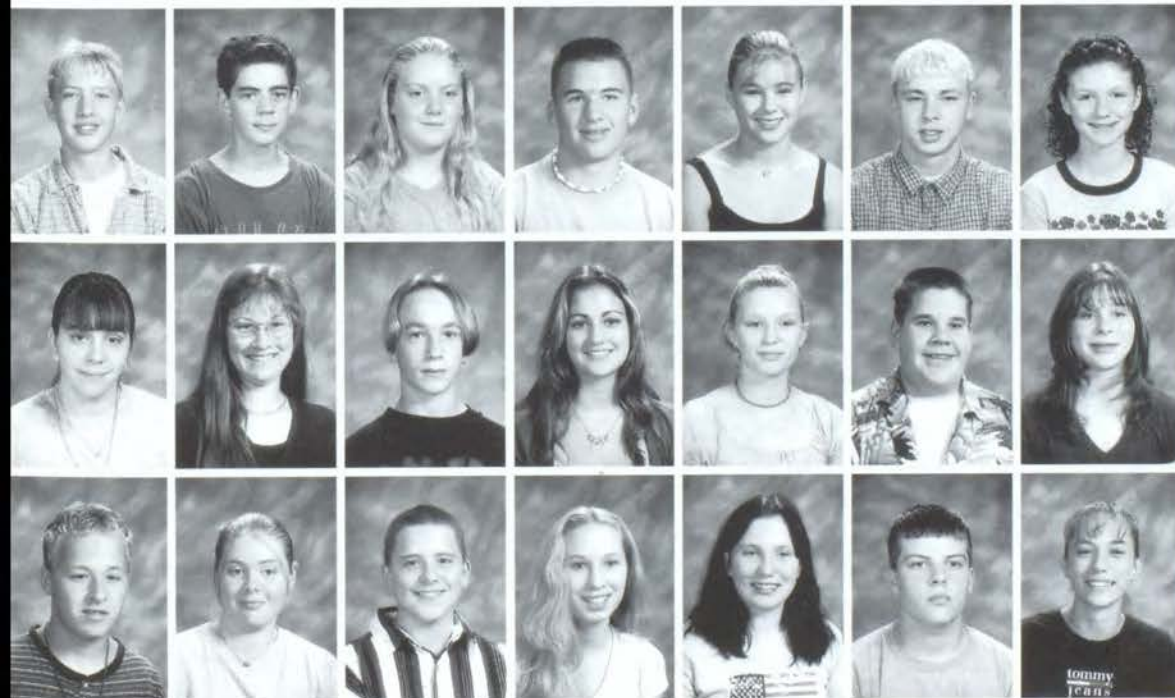

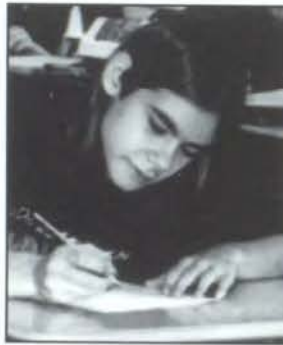

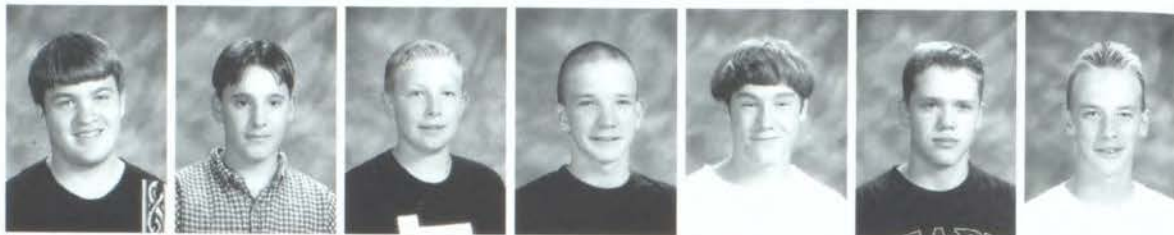

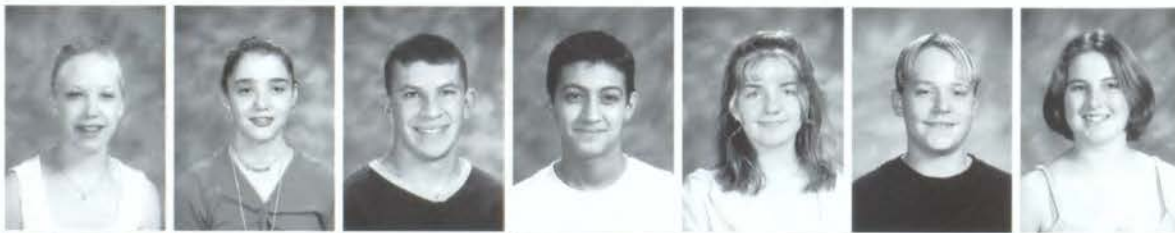

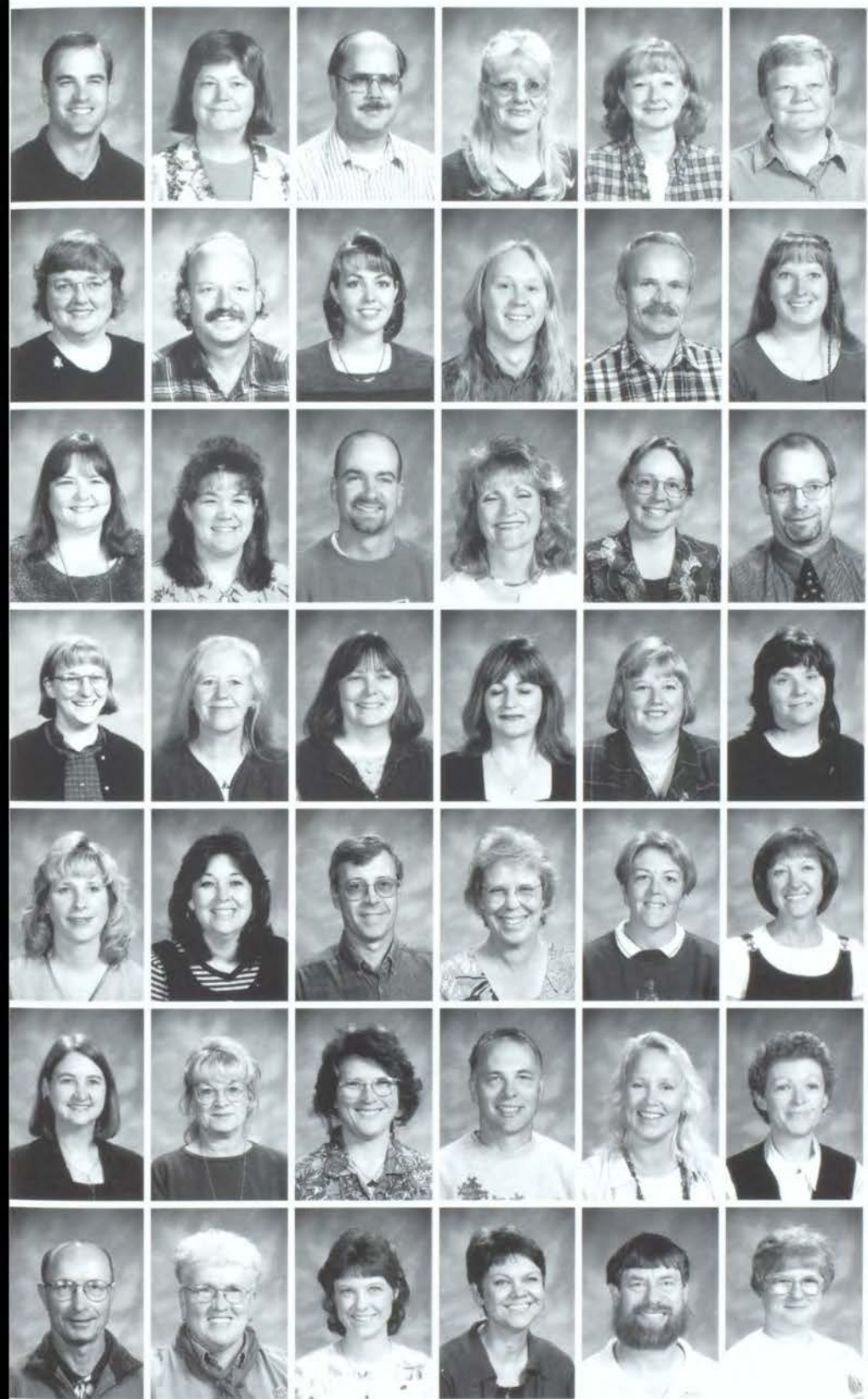

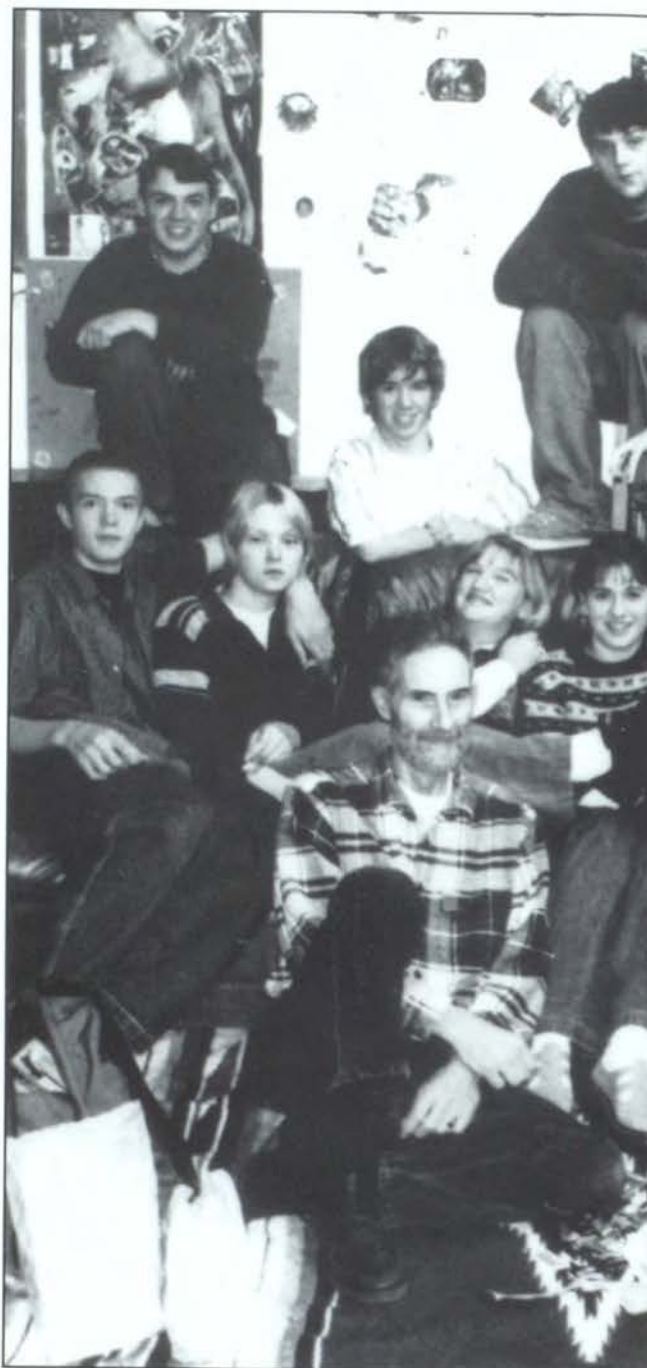

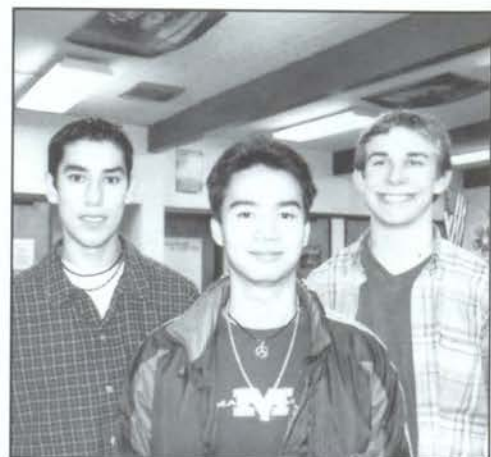

“In architecture, we expanded on the skills we learned in other classes to draw and design floor plans for houses and buildings,” commented sophomore Cody Schrock.

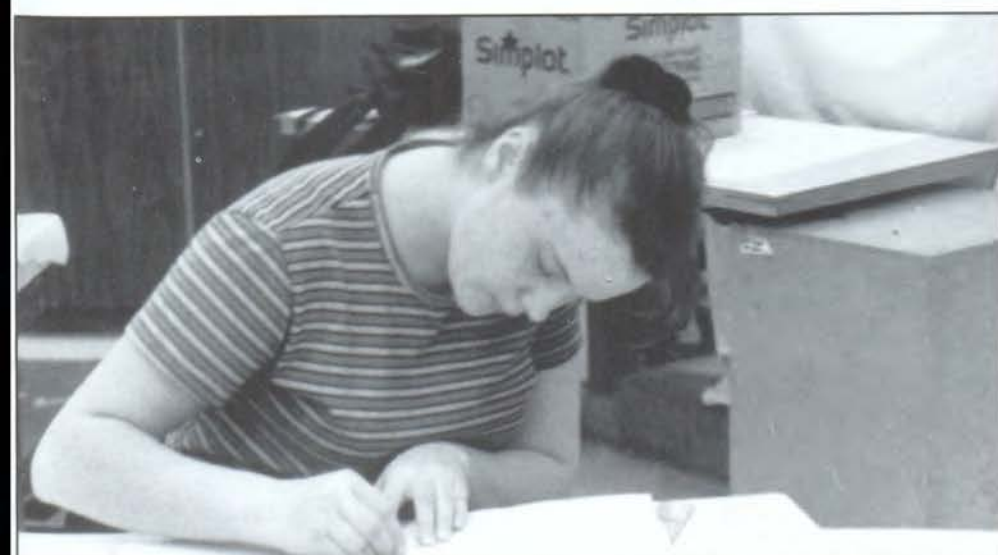
These classes provided students with enjoyment as well as a chance to explore possible career choices in creative pathways.

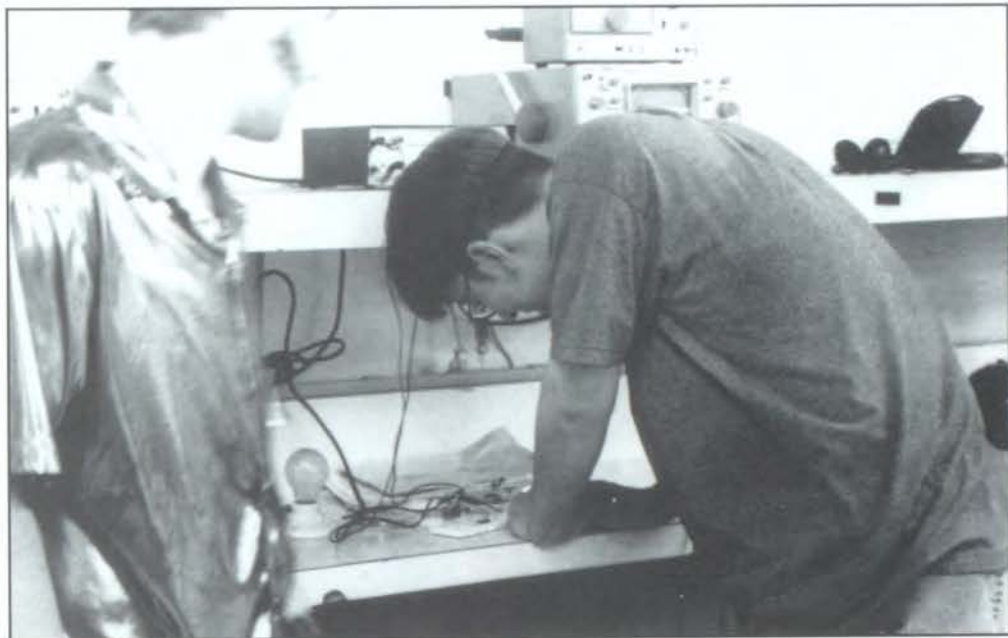

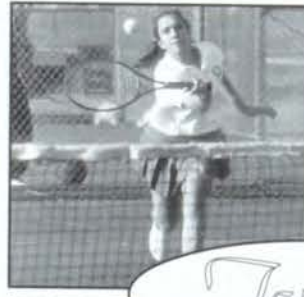
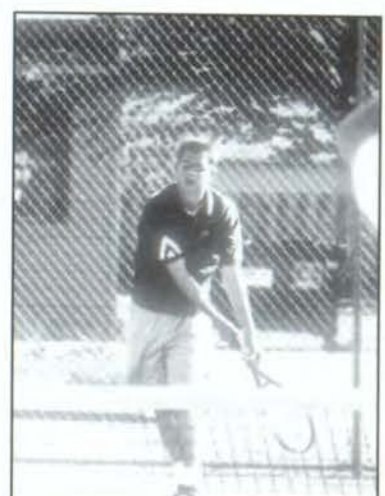
