The four-color endsheets were printed on white vibracolor paper.


The 160-page book with a 16-page supplement was printed by Balfour Publishing in Dallas, TX, on #100 Premier Premium Paper.

Fonts that were used are Kaledoskop, Athena, and **Puschkin**. "The Warrior" was produced using Studioworks and Photoshop CS on Apple Macintosh eMac and iMac computers. Digital photographs were taken with 6.3 megapixel Canon Digital Rebel, 8.2 megapixel Canon 20D and 30D digital SLR cameras and 10.1 megapixel Canon 40D Digital SLR cameras.

Six hundred books were sold at a cost of \$50 before January 6 and \$55 thereafter.


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

testing sections.




Homecoming TCARNIVAL

Junior Richard Casteen said, "It was festive, fun and delicious!"




Powder Puff & Tuff Puff




Winter Formal SNOWED IN



Whether through drawings, pictures, sports or other after-school activities, the staff knows how to showcase their talents.






















Wrestling










